

BELLOMANIS AFTER THE PURSE

Wants Gans To Take the Glory
End While Nelson Gets
The Money.

BIG HITCH IN PROCEEDINGS.

Gans Threatens To Return To San
Francisco If Nelson Doesn't Come
To Terms at Once.

Goldfield, Nev., Aug. 9.—Bill Nolan faced a crowd of miners, gamblers and business men tonight and angrily declared that he had not asked for \$5000 additional money at last evening's conference between Rickard, Gans and himself.

"I did insist on 10 per cent of the purse, win or lose, for Nelson," he declared, "and that goes. I also insisted that Gans weigh 130 pounds three hours before entering the ring. That time is all settled. The weight is 130 pounds. Gans agreeing to show me his weight each hour for three hours before entering the ring. Nelson will fight here Labor day, and I will have the fight in Goldfield that place, the country today. I do not have to fight for a square deal here."

Gans refused to treat further with Nolan today, alleging that his color declared him from a man of equality. He has nominated L. M. Sullivan to represent him. Nolan declares he will fight with Gans only Sullivan offered \$5000 to Nolan if he would agree to divide the purse with Gans. Nolan refused. Gans angrily declared then that if he could not "lick" Nelson in two rounds he would give his money to charity. "January" Jones, a local mining operator, had \$5000 on Gans at once money today.

Sullivan and Rickard are to meet late tonight and it is thought that articles will be signed.

Nolan is angry at a report that Gans will return to San Francisco if articles are not signed immediately. He says that Gans had late declared that he would fight Nelson for training expenses, if necessary, and that he will never get another chance if he does not fight him in Goldfield.

No result came from tonight's conference between Nolan, Gans, Sullivan and Rickard. Gans proposed to take \$1000 for his share of the purse if Nolan would act as referee. Nolan declared he would not act for \$1000, and stated that Gans must agree to his terms by tomorrow night or stop paid and allow another man to be chosen.

DIFFICULTIES SETTLED

Nelson and Gans at Last Signed Up for
Goldfield Battle.

Goldfield, Aug. 10.—Joe Gans and Billy Nolan, manager for Battling Nelson, signed articles for the fight Labor day at 11 o'clock last night in the presence of "Tex" Rickard, George Wingfield and L. M. Sullivan, whose efforts were mainly responsible for the agreement.

CHICAGO BACKS PULLIAM

President Murphy of the Chicago Club
Writes a Letter.

New York, Aug. 9.—Charles W. Murphy, president of the Chicago baseball team, wrote to the National league today to state to the president of the league, Harry C. Pulliam, commending him for the stand he took with regard to the forfeited game at the Polo grounds Tuesday.

In his letter he says that under the National league constitution the New York club could be properly fined \$1000 for its action in excluding Empire Johnstone. "The Chicago club will not admit that this fine be assessed by the board of directors of the National league. Manager Frank L. Chance, all players and myself feel that we have won a most signal victory by striking a telling blow anarchy in baseball. The good will and esteem of the press and public of the United States is sufficient reward for us."

MORE BURNING WORDS.

President Pulliam of National League
Again Increases His Bating Average.

New York, Aug. 9.—Sam Strang, the member of the New York National league baseball club, who was called upon by Captain McGraw of the New York team to umpire the Chicago-New York game at the Polo grounds on Tuesday, when Empire Johnstone was excluded, today reported his action to President Harry C. Pulliam of the National league. Strang said he had awarded the game to New York by forfeit.

President Pulliam replied in a letter that he was at a loss to understand how Strang being a member of the New York team should address such a communication to him. After reviewing the records of the forfeited game, President Pulliam said:

"Your action in appearing upon the ball field, you being possessed of all the facts, was not only high-handed defiance of the laws of the National league, but an act of extreme and unbecomingly discourteous action to me as president of the National league. I would be strict in disciplining you for this impudence, but I propose to look upon your action with contempt and therefore take no action save this letter."
