Result of the Operations of the D. and M. Society.

By reference to the list of premiums awar at the Annual Fair of the Deseret Agricult and Manufacturing Society, it will be that the citizens of other counties compe favorably with those of Great Salt Lake stock, field crops, vegetables and manaf tures, and, so far as we have heard, the awa gave general satisfaction to the competitor In looking over the list we were somew disappointed at the scantiness of Class as it seems to manifest an indifference on part of agriculturists and mechanics gen ally in relation to a subject of so much imp tance to the prosperity of the country and successful tillage of the soil as the o struction of, and improvements in agricultu implements and machines. We were aw that the premiums fixed for that class w small; but knowing that the society was in its infancy and that its funds would permit the officers to make them much larg without curtailing the lists in other clas very materially, the hope was entertained t they would be deemed sufficient to call fo the inventive genius and mechanical skill some of the citizens, and that there would a fair display at the exhibition of many, not all the articles included in the publish list of proposed awards; but the pri were evidently considered too small for c sideration or there has not been as much terest taken in the premises as expected, necessary to the successful cultivation of earth and consequent thrift of the peo generally, and especially of those engaged agricultural pursuits. In Class F there were, of course, no entr made as there were no premiums awarded, if there were, none were reported. The p sumption is, that the premiums proposed w insufficient to induce machinists to exhi their complex structures, and not that no n chines have been made in the Territory of kind designated, for, if not mistaken in conclusions, there has been more machine constructed in Utah within the past ye than in any other since the settleme of the country; and in all probability amount and variety will continue to crease yearly, till importation will entire cease, whether the society can, with limited means, offer such premiums from til to time as will have a tendency to accelerate its production and improve its quality a kind, by inciting competition or not.
