## Result of the Operations of the D. A. and M. Society.

By reference to the list of premiums awarded at the Annual Fair of the Deseret Agricultural and Manufacturing Society, it will be seen that the citizens of other counties competed favorably with those of Great Salt Lake in stock, field crops, vegetables and manufactures, and, so far as we have heard, the awards gave general satisfaction to the competitors.

In looking over the list we were somewhat disappointed at the scantiness of Class E, as it seems to manifest an indifference on the part of agriculturists and mechanics generally in relation to a subject of so much importance to the prosperity of the country and the successful tillage of the soil as the construction of, and improvements in agricultural implements and machines. We were aware that the premiums fixed for that class were small; but knowing that the society was yet in its infancy and that its funds would not permit the officers to make them much larger, without curtailing the lists in other classes very materially, the hope was entertained that they would be deemed sufficient to call forth the inventive genius and mechanical skill of some of the citizens, and that there would be a fair display at the exhibition of many, if not all the articles included in the published list of proposed awards; but the prizes were evidently considered too small for consideration or there has not been as much interest taken in the premises as expected, and necessary to the successful cultivation of the earth and consequent thrift of the people generally, and especially of those engaged in agricultural pursuits.

In Class F there were, of course, no entries made as there were no premiums awarded, or if there were, none were reported. The presumption is, that the premiums proposed were insufficient to induce machinists to exhibit their complex structures, and not that no machines have been made in the Territory of the kind designated, for, if not mistaken in our conclusions, there has been more machinery constructed in Utah within the past year than in any other since the settlement of the country; and in all probability the amount and variety will continue to increase yearly, till importation will entirely cease, whether the society can, with its limited means, offer such premiums from time to time as will have a tendency to accelerate its production and improve its quality and kind, by inciting competition or not.

Progression is the order of the day, and although the operations of the society have not been as extensive as the President and Directors have desired, yet it has done much in awakening the dormant energies of the people, by inducing them to rely upon their own exertions in agriculture and manufactures for producing the necessaries and comforts of life which, if continued, will result in their social independence; and unquestionably as time progresses, circumstances will be such that premiums can be offered that will attract the attention of mechanics and machinists, and induce them to make a better display hereafter of such articles as they severally manufacture than they did at the late Fair.
