## USED DRUGS ON SOLDIERS

### RILEY'S SLAYERS ARE IDENTIFIED

SCORE BY INNINGS

So Declares Police Lieutenant  
Hempel at Headquarters  
This Morning.

### WOMAN IMPORTANT WITNESS

Mrs. W. A. Rector Says the Pair Left  
Her Rooming House Night  
of the Murder.

We are practically certain that R. E. Kennedy and L. E. Driskell are the men who were responsible for the murder of Special Officer C. C. Riley," said Lieut. Hempel this morning.

According to Chief of Detectives Sheets, his men are making a record which will show every movement made by the two suspects from the morning of Tuesday, Oct. 5, up to the time they were arrested by the Ogden police.

Captain Bryan Conrad, Fifteenth Infantry, who conducted the raid on the Angels rooming house this afternoon resulting in the capture of George Rector on the grave charge of deserting the government out of regard for deserts by dragging soldiers with their leaves excepted, said in the News after the raid: "The arrest of Reniger and the exposure of his system explains the great increase in artificial desertion during the past four months."

A searching investigation is to be made in the police department to find who are the policemen who may have been in on Reniger's scheme. The greats of deserters have been made within a small circle of police officers and the heads of the department will investigate the case to the bottom to see if, or not, any of the policemen are partners with Reniger.

Capt. Clark, adjutant of the Fifteenth, says after a consultation with Capt. Barlow, that the military authorities will place the entire Reniger case in the hands of the civil authorities.

The Ogden police claim to have found the revolver formerly carried by Kennedy, and that it is the gun with which Riley was shot.

Besides young Knowlton Nobeker, the youth who was held up on the night of the raid, many others have been identified by the detective to strengthen the identification of Kennedy and Driskell, including Henry Shearer, who says he does not think Kennedy was the man he saw Thomas Hardin, driver of a sprouting wagon, who saw one of the men running away. Everett, night bartender at Stadelman Bros., who saw one of the hooligans running on the street behind Riley, and Mrs. West, who claims to have seen one of the men who shot the officer.

The Ogden police say that they have found and can produce at the proper time a certain man who claims he told him that Capt. Reniger had been taken to keep Driskell from being taken to the police station, fearing that he would "get 20 years for the hold-up."

### BIG LAND AND SHEEP DEAL.

OGDEN, Oct. 16.—A big land and sheep deal was closed here this morning. The county of Weber, about 2,000 square miles of ranch land situated north of Ogden, belonging to the estate of the late A. R. C. Smith, was sold to Denny A. Smith, proprietor of the Phoenix hotel in this city. The amount involved was not given out.

### MORE AFFIDAVITS IN MT. M'KINLEY DISPUTE

They Tell of Movements of the Party And What Barrill Told the Affidavits; Nothing More.

New York, Oct. 16.—Four more affidavits were made public here today in connection with the investigation of Dr. Frederick A. Cook's expedition to Mount McKinley. Three of them are signed by members of the Cook party: Paul Prints, a guide, Walter Miller, photographer, and Samuel Beecher. Their testimony relates in detail to movements of the party, explaining that Cook and Barrill were alone together during the period in which Dr. Cook reached the summit of Mount McKinley. All three say that Barrill assured them later that Dr. Cook's story was false.

Three affidavits are that of Dr. John E. Shore, a physician of Leavenworth, Wash., who tells of a conversation with Oscar F. Blankenship of the United States forestry service, in which Dr. Cook stated that Dr. Cook's claim to have climbed Mount McKinley was false, though as the fact was impossible in the short time during which Cook and Barrill were absent. Blankenship was located near Mount McKinley at the time Cook's expedition was there.

Three cases alleged. There are three specific instances of the party which the army officers say they will have no difficulty in proving. Capt. Conrad declares that this is more than anything else shows the reason for so many desertions recently from the Fifteenth, a regiment which Barrill has had a comparatively clean bill of health in this regard.

The police and army officers declare that they are on the trail of the second party to the deal and will have him ready before many hours have passed. The army officers say that Barrill has been in his quarters trying to cover his tracks.

The result was that they overstayed their leave and were caught on their company rolls as deserters. Then Reniger turned them over to the post authorities and the reward offered by the government for the apprehension of deserters was claimed. This netted Reniger and his partner \$50 for each

case.

**CROWN SNUFF USED.**

The "dope" used is said to have been "Crown snuff," in which was placed drugs. Once the victim was in his clutches, it was easy for Reniger to drug his victim in his clutches for as long as desired.

**STEELMAN'S EXPERIENCE.**

Berry Steelman, who was arrested Saturday and charged with being a Reniger, was fully convinced the officers had lost all of his innocence and then left Reniger yesterday morning. In the course of time he was doped and then Reniger left him. Steelman is a man of particularly robust physique and it was not long before he recovered his consciousness.
