"'No request for donations or subscriptions will be entertained, nor ad-vertisements placed in any but estab-lished publications unless written en-dorsement from the Manufacturers and Merchants' association has been ob-

ained.' "These notices were supplied to our members to be displayed in their of-fices and stores and the result has been almost magic. Hardly an advertising proposition is now worked in this city and I have not given an endorsement to any during the last year and a half. In fact the situation is so well known among the schemers and fakirs that they no longer select Los Angeles as their place of operation.
