### P. N. LEAGUE SAID TO BE A DEAD ONE

This Announcement is Semi-Officially Made by Lucas and M'Closkey.

### MAY BE REORCANIZED

Trouble is With Walter Wilmot-Latter Has Nerve and Wants \$2,500 For Butte Franchise.

(Special to the "News.") Butte, Mont., Jan. 5 .- President W. H. Lucas and John J. McCloskey have concluded an inquest held upon the Pacific eague, they have given it out semiofficially that the organization is dead. President Lucas left last night for Spoane. Manager McCloskey, who is acting under instructions from the president, will undertake to secure the Butte franchise from Manager Walter Wilmot, In the event he succeeds in getting it, he will try to reorganize the old league, or perhaps form a new one altogether, Manager Wilmot had a conference last night with Mr. Lucas and Mr. McCloskey. He offered the franchise to Mc-Closkey for \$2,500, but that offer was not considered. Mr., McCloskey said he would give \$600 for it, and soon after the conference came to an end without anything definite being accomplished.

"The fact is," said Mr. McCloskey, "the franchise isn't worth 30 cents, there is no league. When Boise left the league the organization became disrupted. However, 1 am willing to give \$500 for Mr. Wilmot's good will. We want to deal fairly with him and with the people of Butte. He may dispose of his players as he sees fit. I would like to start out new, and if can get the franchise I will attempt to organize a stock company here. These are my instructions from President Lucas. At any event, the Pacific National league is a dead one."

The above is not very pleasing to the loyal fans of Salt Lake.

Yesterday it was announced that the league was about to be reorganized with six clubs, namely, Salt Lake, Butte, Seattle, Tacoma, Helena and Spokane, Today comes the news that there will

be no Pacific National league, And why?

All because McCloskey is sore because Wilmot will not sell the Butte franchise for \$500. Wise Walter wants \$2,500 for There is no question that Wilmot's demands are absurd, and a great many will think that McCloskey's \$500 offer is also foolish. It is doubtful if Wilmot expects to get anything like the amount he asks, or if McCloskey expects to ge-cure the franchise for 3500. The question that is being asked by the franc is:

The question that is being asked by the fans is: "Why should the league be disrupted because of the trouble in Butte?" There are other clues anxious to get in-to the league, and it is difficult to under-stand the why's and wherefor's of the owner of the Butte franchise either run-ning or breaking up the league It is doubtful if the league will be broken up on this account. It is more rea-sonable to believe that a satisfactory set-tlement will be reached between the contending factions; that the league will
