FAILURE OF EXPERIMENT FARM NOT LEHI'S FAULT

(Special Correspondence.)
LEHI, Utah Co., May 12.—Referring
to the article in last night's "News" from Provo, stating that Secy. of State Tingey had written a letter to the county commissioners stating that the county would have the running of the central experiment farm here and all crops thereon for the next two years. as water for the station had not been furnished and no appropriations would be available. The statement in the article that Lehi people had not lived up to their agreement to furnish enough water to run the station is resented here, as they have been and are ready to furnish their share of what water may be necessary. In addition to what water belonged to the station, an agreement had been signed between Lehi and American Fork people to make up the deficiency, the Lehi people turned over 63 shares of water to the Lehi Irrigation company and authorized them to give that number of shares to the state, and the American Fork people were to turn over 50 shares of water, which agreement was accepted by the special committee appointed by the last legis-lature to investigate this station. Lohi turned over these 63 sharese of water for the use of the station two years ago and it has been in the hands of the Lehi Irrigation company for the use of the state and Lehi has been waiting during that time for American Fork people to furnish their 50 shares of wa-ter as agreed upon, which they have not done. Since the station was located here. Lehi has always furnished more than its share of the water, but the American Fork people have not done what they agreed to, therefore the entire blame and responsibility of losing the appropriation and having it turned back to the county rests upon
