Albany, 19.—Governor Cleveland's letter, formally accepting the Democratic nomination for President of the United States, isjas follows:

Gentlemen—I have received your communication dated July 28, 1884, in forming me of my momination to the office of President of the United States by the National Democratic Convention lately assembled at Chicago. I accept the nomination with a grateful appreciation of the supreme honor conferred, and a solemn sense of the responsibility which, in the acceptance, I assume. I have carefully considered the platform adopted by the convention, and cordially approve the same. So plain a statement of the Democratic faith and the principles upon which that party appeals to the suffrages of the people, useds no supplement or explanation. It should be remembered that the office of President is essentially executive in its nature.
