

# REPUBLICANS MEET IN TORRID SESSION

Two Factions Wax Wroth at Club Rooms Last Night.

## SEEK TO REPUDIATE ORGAN.

Resolution Emanating from "Insurgent" Quarter Fails of Adoption And Argument Follows.

At a session of the Young Mens' Republican club held last night, an attempt was made by the committee of 15, to secure the passage of a resolution condemning the attitude of the Inter-Mountain Republican for the trend its editorial comment had assumed with regard to the actions of the so-called "Insurgent" wing of the party. It is said that there was a resolution in the coat pocket of some member present last night in which Harry Joseph was to be "searched" for his attitude in the factional fight. But this resolution was lost sight of and was not introduced.

Following the introduction of the first resolution, which apparently went before the meeting without a sponsor until Stephen Stanford volunteered to father it "to get it before the meeting," numerous speeches were made. The trend of these speeches was not pertinent to the resolution, but, on the contrary, became forcible tirades directed to Senator Smith. In the meantime, when a vote might be heard upon the motion, some members of the club who have not identified themselves with the Critchlow committee took exception to the procedure upon parliamentary grounds. When a vote was called for the adoption of the resolution, it was defeated by two votes, the result standing 15-17.

### THE VOTE.

During the discussion it was urged by those not identified with the "Insurgents" that the constitution and by-laws of the club, which specify that one of the purposes of the club is to seek harmony in matters of politics, the Republican party prohibited the introduction and discussion of the resolution and upon that ground the president, C. S. Buckwaltor, who is a member of the committee of 15, was asked to take it from the meeting. The resolution was withdrawn and the vote was the only possible method of defeat remaining. It was the sentiment of the meeting as expressed in the vote which was probably responsible for the relegation of the Joseph resolution.

### MISTAKE CAUSES EXCITEMENT.

There has been more or less excitement in Wells-Fargo Express circles this week, over the arrival of five express cars at Ogden for the Short Line, marked "Wells-Fargo Express company." The supposition was that by some error dead part of the Short Line, if not all, had originated from the Pacific Express and headed to the Wells-Fargo Express company. Inquiry develops that the lettering was a mistake in the Omaha shop, and should have read "Wells-Fargo Express company." It was due to the negligence of the boss of the paint shop that a previous order for five express cars for the use of the Wells-Fargo company on the Southern Pacific California road was complicated. The lettering is now being changed at Ogden, and the excitement has subsided in the Wells-Fargo offices in this city.

### A. B. RICHARDS DEAD.

Was an Old Plainsman and Indian Fighter of Nebraska.

Nebraska City, Neb., May 1.—A. B. Richards, an old plainsman and Indian fighter, died here last night, aged 68. He came to Nebraska from Canada, in 1855, and ran a store or ranch for prairie freights at O'Fallon's Bluff, now known as North Platte now is. He was known by Indians as "Ochilla" or "The Kid." He was engaged in many fights with the Indians in the early days. In later years he accumulated considerable wealth.

### RELIEF WORK.

Maj. Devol asks for tents for 2,500 people and 30 hospital tents.

Washington, May 1.—Maj. Devol, in charge of the relief work on behalf of the storm-damaged areas in the south made a telephone request today for tents for 2,500 people and 30 hospital tents. These will be sent at once to Helena, Miss., probably from Philadelphia. Upon request of Maj. Devol was telegraphed \$2,000 in cash today by the Red Cross. He also asked for 24 nurses. Maj. Simpson has been or-

dered to relieve Maj. Devol, and will leave here tonight for that purpose. The Red Cross announces that owing to the state of its funds, contributions from the public may be sent to its headquarters at the war department in this city.

### MOONSHINE BUTTER.

U. S. Revenue Officers Raid a Factory In Chicago.

Chicago, May 1.—United States revenue officers raided an alleged "moonshiners'" oleomargarine factory yesterday, arresting four men and securing 1,000 pounds of colored butterine.

The factory was located in the basement and two floors of a barn at 280 Monroe street. Besides the coloring mixture a large amount of the white oleomargarine was found with the colored by the manufacturer for the coloring of the substitute for butter. The plant is said to have been capable of turning out several hundred pounds of colored oleomargarine a day.

### PLEAS TO VISIT HONGKONG.

Hongkong, May 1.—It was learned here today that the American government has accepted an invitation for the battleship fleet to visit Hongkong on its way around the world.

### BEATS ALL RECORDS.

Cruiser Indomitable Makes 28 Knots Over Measured Mile.

Glasgow, April 30.—It is unofficially reported that the new cruiser Indomitable, now undergoing her speed trials, has beaten all records, making 28 knots over a measured mile in the Clyde on March 30. ### HUGE PETITION FOR CAPT. VAN SCHACK'S PARDON

Washington, April 30.—An immense petition, bearing the signatures of 243,000 persons, requesting that a pardon be granted to Capt. William Van Schack, master of the ill-fated General Slocum when the vessel was destroyed by fire in New York harbor on June 15, 1904 with a loss of more than 1,000 lives, was presented yesterday to the president and the attorney-general by a committee of the American Legion of Masters, mates and officers. The committee was introduced to the president by Representative Law of Brooklyn and the national president of the association, Capt. John H. Prueett, made a personal appeal to both the president and to the attorney-general for Capt. Van Schack's pardon. The president assured the committee that the matter would receive careful consideration.

He was found lying on the floor of the saloon, and Murphy made two further attempts on his life, once shooting him through the lung and again by taking arsenic. He was known to be
