

UTAH LEGISLATURE.

COUNCIL.

Jan. 19th, 1880, 3 p. m.

The business on the table came up in its order.

The bill for an act to change the name of Charles Angel Hendrickson to Charles Angel Henry Bulow, and the bill to change the name of Hans Jorgen Christiansen to Hans Jorgen Rasmussen, were taken up, read and passed record readings.

A committee on enrollment was added to the list of standing committees, and Councilors Wells and Smith were appointed said committee.

Tuesday, January 20th, 1880.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. The President in the chair. Councilor Snow presented the Financial Report of Washington County, which was read.

Councilor Caine moved that the report be received and referred to the committee on printing, with instructions to confer with a committee from the House, with a view to having all such reports printed as soon as possible for the use of the Assembly. Carried.

The report of the Probate Judge of Washington County, relating to the bridge in course of construction over the Rio Virgen River, and asking for an additional appropriation for the continuance of the work, was received and referred to the committee on roads, bridges, etc.

The committee on judiciary asked leave to present, as a substitute for the bill for an act to enable the Utah Eastern Railroad to own and work coal mines, a bill for an act to amend chapter 2, title 11, Compiled Laws, entitled "Of Railroad Companies," and recommended that the latter be placed upon its passage. Received and referred to committee on railroads.

The bill for an act to change the names of Charles Angel Hendrickson to Charles Angel Henry Bulow, and that to change the name of Hans Jorgen Christiansen to Hans Jorgen Rasmussen, were both read the third time and passed.

Council adjourned till Wednesday at 2 p. m.

Proceedings, Wednesday, Jan. 21, 1880.

Communication from Hon. O. J. Hollister, acknowledging the courtesy of the Council in tendering him the freedom of its chamber, was read.

(H. F. No. 15.) "A bill for an Act prescribing fees for the Secretary of Utah Territory," was taken up on its first reading, read the first time, and, on motion of Councilor Wells, passed its first reading and was referred to the committee on judiciary.

(H. F. No. 7) "An Act providing for the organization of San Juan County," Read the first time, and on motion of Councilor Thurber passed its first reading, and was referred to the committee on counties.

(H. F. No. 6) "An Act conferring exclusive jurisdiction on Justices of the Peace," was then taken up, read the first time, and,

On motion of Councilor Fotheringham passed its first reading, and was referred to the committee on judiciary.

On motion of Councilor Thurber the concurrent resolution of the House in relation to limiting the number of minutes of each house of the Assembly to seventy-five copies, instead of one hundred and fifty, was concurred in.

House messages were received reporting the passage by that body of the bill for acts changing the name of Christiansen to Rasmussen, and that of Hendrickson to Bulow.

A petition from 142 citizens of Sevier County, for an appropriation to open a road through Marysville Cañon, on the Sevier, was presented and referred to the committee on roads, cañons, etc.

A petition from 41 residents of Davis County asking for the annexation to that county of Antelope Island in Great Salt Lake and the intervening waters between it and the western boundary of the county, was referred to the committee on counties.

A petition from W. E. Snow, assessor and collector of Washington County, asking for the remission of certain delinquent territorial taxes, amounting to \$66.17, and for the reimbursement of ex-Assessor D. Seegmiller to the amount of \$15.07, was referred to the committee on claims and appropriations.

The bill to amend the charter of Salt Lake City was reported back, with the suggestion for an amendment in the third section, setting aside the collections from all licenses and fines for the payment of the bonds, instead of the collections from the licenses for the sale of liquors only. Report received, and recommendations for the bill's passage adopted.

A House message was received announcing the passage thereof of the bill amending section 1033 of the Compiled Laws.

The bill to grant railroads the privilege of deeding and mortgaging their franchises, &c.; and its accompanying bill, amending chapter 2, title 11, Compiled Laws, was reported back with the recommendation that the latter be made an amendment to the former. Accepted.

A bill for the extension of the boundaries of Davis County, passed its first reading and was referred to committee on counties.

A message from the House was received and its contents concurred in, relative to the purchase and retention for the use of future legislatures, of copies of Compiled Laws, &c.

The bill to amend the charter of Salt Lake City was taken up and the amendments proposed by the committee adopted. During the second reading, several amendments were made, and a motion to strike out the clause exempting the bonds from taxation was discussed until the Council adjourned to meet on Thursday at 2 p. m.

January 22, 1880.

After the usual preliminaries, a communication from the House stating that H. F. No. 16, "To amend section 72 of the Compiled Laws of Utah," had passed the House, was read.

Councilor E. Snow presented the following report:

Your committee on claims and appropriations to whom was referred H. F. 15, "A Bill for An Act Prescribing Fees for the Secretary of Utah Territory," beg leave to report that they have had said bill

under consideration, and herewith report it back to the Council with the recommendation that it be amended by adding thereto another clause to read "For any other commission \$1," and that it be placed upon its passage.

On motion of Councilor Harrington the report was accepted.

On motion of Councilor Caine, the rules were suspended and H. F. No. 15, An act prescribing fees for the Secretary of the Territory, was taken up on its second reading.

On motion of Councilor Fotheringham the bill was amended as recommended by the committee. The bill was then read the second time, and

On motion of Councilor Harrington, passed its second reading.

The bill was then taken up on its third reading, read by its title, and,

On motion of Councilor Caine, passed its third reading.

The title was then read and approved, and the bill was sent to the House for their concurrence in the amendment.

Proceedings in progress.

HOUSE.

Tuesday, Jan. 20 1880, 3 p. m.

Mr. Peterson presented petition of Warren Peacock and 26 others residents of Castle Valley, Sanpete Co., remonstrating against the creation of a new county out of the eastern part of Sanpete Co., referred to the committee on counties.

Mr. Winn presented petition of Thos. R. Butler and 80 others asking for an extension of the eastern boundary of the city of Lehi. Referred to the committee on municipal corporations and townsites.

Mr. Sharp, chairman of revision, presented report on resolutions concerning standing committees, recommending the addition of four members to the committee on claims, of one member to the committee on judiciary, the abolishing of the committee on postal affairs, and that a committee on fish and game be appointed.

The report was adopted, and on suggestion of Mr. Lyman, Messrs. W. B. Preston, W. H. Dusenberry, J. N. Smith and Jas. Sharp were added to the committee on claims, and Mr. J. N. Smith was added to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Sharp reported back H. F. No. 12, with amendments, which were adopted, and the bill was taken up on its second reading.

The bill (H. F. 12) reported back by Mr. Sharp, with amendments, and the latter adopted, being taken up on its second reading was discussed to some length and then on motion laid upon the table.

The committee on agriculture, &c., reported two bills. The first recommended that \$6.50 be allowed the Sealer of Weights and Measures for righting the scales of the Territory. The sum was allowed. The second was a report on the bill amending section 72 of the Compiled Laws, and included a substitute for the original bill. The substitute was accepted.

The bill for an act providing fees for the Secretary of the Territory, was reported back with amendments, accepted in lieu of the original and after its third reading passed the House.

The bill for an act conferring exclusive original jurisdiction on Justices of the peace, was slightly amended and also passed the House.

The bill for an act creating San Juan County passed.

The financial reports of Summit and Salt Lake Counties, for two years, were presented.

The oath was administered to the watchman of the House, who was absent the first day of the session.

It was moved and carried that hereafter but 75 copies, instead of 150, of the minutes of both houses be printed for the use of the Assembly.

The effect of a motion to lie on the table coming up for discussion, and the Speaker deciding that such a motion, if carried, practically killed a bill; it was moved and carried that it be the sense of the House, that a motion to lie on the table be merely to lie there during the will of the House, and that this motion cover all measures heretofore disposed of in that manner.

House adjourned till Wednesday, at 2 p. m.

Wednesday, Jan. 21, 1880, 2 p. m.

A message from the Council an-

nouncing the passage of H. F. No. 4, a bill for an act to change the name of Charles Angel Hendrickson to Charles Angel Henry Bulow, which was read the second and third times and, on motion of Mr. Murdock passed.

The Speaker announced the appointment of Messrs. Johnson, Snow and Snell as standing committee on fish and game.

A message was received from the Council announcing the passage of C. F. No. 2, A bill for an act changing the name of Hans Jorgen Christiansen to Hans Jorgen Rasmussen.

C. F. No. 2 was read second and third times and on motion of Mr. Winn, passed.

Mr. Smith, chairman of agriculture, trades and manufactures, presented H. F. No. 16, "A bill for an act amending section 72 Compiled Laws of Utah." Read first, second and third times, and on motion of Mr. Grover passed.

Mr. Murdock presented petition of F. C. Murray and 110 others, citizens of Piute County, asking for an appropriation of \$3,000 to build a road down the Sevier River, and moved its reference to the committee on roads, etc. Referred.

Mr. Peery presented H. F. No. 17, A bill for an act amending the charter of Ogden City, which was read the first time and on motion of Mr. Peery was referred to the committee on municipal corporations and townsites.

Mr. Fisher presented H. F. No. 18, "A Bill for An Act changing the time for holding elections in the Territory of Utah."

Referred to the committee on elections.

Two bills relating to irrigation were presented by Mr. Winn, and referred to the committee on irrigation.

The bill to amend Section 1,020, Compiled Laws, by the insertion of the word "purchase" in the fourth line, passed the House.

A Council message was received, announcing the concurrence of that body, in the reduction of the numbers of copies of minutes to 75.

A bill to change the boundary line between Rich and Summit Counties, was referred to the committee on counties.

A bill to amend section 415, Compiled Laws, was referred to the committee on trade and manufacture.

A bill to incorporate irrigation companies was referred to committee on irrigation.

A bill relating to the duties of district poundkeepers was referred to committee on agriculture, etc.

The financial report for 1879-80, of Box Elder County was presented. A petition and bill for the incorporation of Nephi, as a city, was referred to the committee on corporations, etc.

The bill to amend section 1732, Compiled Laws, was reported back, with amendments, and on motion re-committed.

House adjourned until Thursday at 2 p. m.

January 22d, 1880.

The Speaker announced the acknowledgement and acceptance of the courtesies of the House, by the following named gentlemen:

Hon. John Taylor, L. J. Nuttall, Esq., Col. O. J. Hollister, Dr. J. R. Park, Professors F. M. Bishop, O. H. Riggs and T. B. Lewis. Their letters of acceptance were read.

Mr. Hatch presented the financial report of Wasatch County. Referred.

Mr. Peery presented the financial report of Weber County. Referred.

Mr. Peery presented petition of Weber County Irrigation Company, to memorialize Congress to extend the privilege of the Homestead Laws and also of the Desert Entry, and moved its reference to the committee on petitions and memorials. Referred.

Mr. Murdock, chairman of elections, reported back H. F. No. 18, "A Bill for an Act changing the time for holding general elections in the Territory of Utah," with amendments. The amendments were read and adopted, the bill then read its second and third times, and on motion passed the House.

Proceedings in progress.
