

WORLD'S PEACE IN GREAT DANGER

Great Britain Has Discovered in Germany a Menace to Her Existence.

ANYTHING MAY START WAR

Andrew Carnegie, Addressing Peace Society, Takes Gloomy View of the Future.

New York, April 21.—That a great conflict is threatened between Great Britain and Germany was the declaration of Andrew Carnegie today before the annual business meeting of the Peace Society of which he is president.

"The time has come," he said, "for the other nations of the world to intervene between the two disturbing powers."

"Never in our day has the world's peace been so seriously threatened," stated Mr. Carnegie.

"Britain has discovered in Germany a menace to her existence. Germany, having equal rights upon the sea, aims to recognize the right of Britain to continue forever as mistress of the sea. France, Japan and Russia are all building Dreadnoughts, which have returned to plague the inventor. Last of all, Austria announces that she has resolved to build three Dreadnoughts, a continuous decision. Indeed, and as a result of a German alliance. All Europe is awake to the presence of a great impending danger."

"Within a small radius, the two gigantic fleets of Germany and Britain will operate, often in sight of each other. The topic of constant discussion on every ship will be their relative power and the probable consequences of battle. The rival crews will regard each other with suspicion, jealousy and hatred, in this only too truly representing the feelings of their countrymen."

"Under such strain a mere spark will suffice. Some day a few marines ashore from one of the rival navies will have an encounter. Perhaps under the influence of liquor they will exchange blows. One is wounded, blood is shed, and the pent up passions of the peoples of the two countries will sweep everything before them. Thus a trifling incident will produce war. Civilized nations, however, have now a common right to be consulted when the peace of the world is at stake."

"It is pre-eminently the mission of our peaceful industrial republic to lead the world to peace. One cannot but indulge the hope that our president may find a way open to remind the two disturbing powers of the fact that our country has a right to protect itself in behalf of its own imperial interests and perhaps to invite the leading naval powers to consider whether some kind of an agreement could not be reached that would avert the appalling danger that threatens to convulse the world in the not distant future."

GOV. LILLEY DEAD.

In Congress He Made a Name as an Enemy of Grafting.

Hartford, Conn., April 21.—George Leavins Lilley, governor of Connecticut, died at the executive mansion tonight after an illness of four weeks.

As soon as the news spread, the fire-bells of Hartford sounded the age of the dead governor—49—and a detachment of the first company, governor's foot guards, immediately was mustered

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to go on duty at the executive mansion.

While in Congress Mr. Lilley commanded notice by an attack upon a bill which was aimed to give a corporation exclusive franchise rights for supplying electricity in the Hawaiian Islands.

In other sessions he attacked the free distribution of seeds by the agricultural department, railroad mail contracts and the print paper combine. When he became a member of the committee on naval affairs he criticized the methods employed against navy yards and the location of many of the yards. Then he attacked the submarine boat contracts. About a year ago Mr. Lilley brought about an inquiry into the submarine situation.

SENATOR CUMMINS' INCOME TAX IDEA

Introduces Amendment to Payne-Aldrich Tariff Bill for Graduated Income Tax.

WOULD PRODUCE \$40,000,000.

Denounces What He Terms "That Association of Slander Known as Am. Protective League."

Washington, April 21.—Senator Cummins today introduced his amendment to the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill, providing for a graduated income tax, which he believes would produce \$40,000,000 revenue. Mr. Cummins pointed out that it differs in some important particulars from either the law of 1894 or the amendment offered by Senator Bailey. It exempts incomes below \$5,000 and authorizes the deduction of that amount from every taxable income. The rate provided for is as follows: Upon incomes not exceeding \$5,000, 2 per cent; not exceeding \$10,000, 3 per cent; not exceeding \$20,000, 4 per cent; not exceeding \$30,000, 5 per cent; not exceeding \$40,000, 6 per cent; not exceeding \$50,000, 7 per cent; upon all incomes exceeding \$50,000, 8 per cent.

Mr. Cummins believes that the graduated tax so provided for will produce a somewhat less revenue than at that tax of 8 per cent.

"The duty is to be levied only upon individual incomes. He treats corporations as mere instrumentalities for individual profit and the chief reason for not including corporations is that to put a tax upon the incomes of corporations is to tax those who are stockholders of the corporations, but whose total incomes would not reach \$5,000, precisely as though they had taxable incomes. This would be the result with a flat rate, but he points out that when the graduated tax is employed it is obvious that the individual income can alone be considered; 'otherwise,' he says, 'the man with the lowest taxable income would, in so far as it is derived from a corporation, often times bear the maximum rate levied upon the highest income.'

The chief object of a graduated income tax law is to put the burden of government upon those who are best able to bear it, and to do so it is necessary to put a higher rate upon the large incomes than upon small ones."

The amendment proposed by Mr. Cummins further provides that all corporations shall make annual reports, showing their gross and net earnings, and the amounts paid as interest and dividends and the persons to whom payments are made, and also the names of all officers or employees receiving \$5,000 a year or more. This would disclose the undivided profits of a corporation as ascertained and the distributed share of each stockholder charged as a part of his income.

Mr. Cummins said he had been represented as making an attack upon the principle of protection by proposing an income tax as a revenue measure.

"I desire," he said, "to disclaim any such intention. I admit that if I am to be measured by the test imposed by that association of slander known as the American Protective League, I will be found to be unsound, on the subject of protection. But if I am measured by the Republican platform and by the declaration of McKinley, Harrison and Blaine, then I am as sound as any senator who marches under the political banner to which I yield my loyalty."

MRS. BOYLE IDENTIFIED.

Merced, Pa., April 21.—Mrs. Boyle, the supposed wife of James H. Boyle, alleged abductor of Willie White, is a mystery no longer.

Tonight it developed that she is Helen McDermott of Chicago. Previous stories that she was a member of a prominent and wealthy family are without foundation. The prosecution had intended to make public Mrs. Boyle's real identity before the beginning of the trial.

SIX PERSONS KILLED BY DESTRUCTIVE TORNADO

Cleveland, April 21.—Six persons were killed, at least 50 injured and a million dollars' worth of property destroyed in a tornado that swept through Cleveland and northern Ohio today.

THE DEAD.

Jasper Cronwell, killed by being blown from a trail at the Cleveland furnace company plant.

Mrs. Olive Phalen, nurse at the state hospital; skull crushed by stone blown from the top of a building.

Unidentified woman, blown into a pond at Wade park and drowned.

Joseph Vesigia, killed by a falling brick.

Louis Petro, crushed by falling roof; died at hospital.

Joseph Zlack, struck in head by flying timber; died in hospital.

Fred Gruel committed suicide during the height of the storm because he was afraid he was about to be killed. He rushed into a barn out of the rain and drank carbolic acid.

WAS MRS. ALICE BRANDT ANNINE CLAUDINE?

Honolulu, April 21.—Mrs. Alice Brandt, whose death in San Francisco following a beating she received at the hands of a man unknown to the authorities has taken the aspect of a mysterious murder, is believed here to have been Annine Claudine, well known in police circles. Henry Fisher, a lampighter who knew the woman in Hilo and who was held by the San Francisco police in the hope that he could throw some light on the tragedy, also is known here.

Mrs. Brandt died at the Emergency hospital in San Francisco Monday night. During the afternoon a stranger had called at her apartment and after administering a terrible beating disappeared. When the police visited the place a few minutes later the woman was unconscious. In addition to severe injuries inflicted by her assailant she was badly burned about the mouth and neck with carbolic acid. An empty vial lay on the floor.

Mrs. Brandt's husband is a sailor on the Fair of China, which is due in San Francisco in a few days. Fisher called at the house upon learning of the tragedy, but protested that he knew nothing of the affair.

CAMP LUZON BANQUET.

ENRICO CARUSO NOTED TENOR WHO WILL UNDERGO THROAT OPERATION.

Enrico Caruso, the great Italian tenor of the Metropolitan Opera company, sailed on the Mauretania Wednesday, and he may never be heard in opera again. He is suffering from a severe attack of rheumatism of the throat and vocal chords. He will go direct to Milan to be operated upon by a specialist. Caruso believes that the treatment and change of climate will soon restore his voice.

CHICAGO UNIVERSITY SITS DOWN ON BIG HATS

Chicago, April 21.—Big hats and lofty pompadours have been censured at the University of Chicago for scientific reasons. "The personal appearances have been placed on the official blacklist by the department of physical culture and athletics, and coeds who insist upon retaining them will feel the wrath of the authorities."

Miss Gertrude Dudley, director of women's athletics, declares that the hats and pompadours not only are entirely unnecessary as aids to the new education, but also are unquestionably unwise and intolerable from a hygienic standpoint.

The immense hats, she says, result in
