SIX PERSONS KILLED BY DESTRUCTIVE TORNADO Cleveland, April 21.—Six persons were killed, at least 50 injured and a mil-lion dollars' worth of property dea-troyed in a tornado that swept through Cleveland and northern Ohio today. Honolulu.April 22.—Mrs. Alice Brandt, whose death in San Francisco following a beating she received at the hands of a man unknown to the authorities has a man unknown to the authorities has taken the aspect of a mysterious mur-der, is believed here to have been An-nine Claudine, well known in police circles. Henry Fisher, a hampighter who knew 12 woman in Hilo and who was held by the San Francisco police in the hope that he could throw some light on the tragedy, also is known here. Mrs. Brandt died at the Emergency hospital in San Francisco Monday night. During the afternoon a strang-er had called at her apartments and after administering a terrible beating disappeared. When the police visited the place a few minutes later the wom-an was unconscious. In addition to severe trijuries inflicted by her as-sailant she was badly burned about the mouth and neck with carbolic asid. An empty visit lay on the floor. Mrs. Brandt's husband is a sailor on the Falls of Chine, which is due in Ean Francisco in a few days. Fisher railed at the bouse upon learning of the tragedy, but protested that he knew nothing of the affair. CAMP LUZON BANQUET.
