## AMERICAN. THE FIRE FIEND.

Vesuels, Villages and Forests on

Fire in Various Places. PORT JARVIS, N. Y., 3.-The entire village of Gilman's Depot, on the Port Jarvis and Monticello railroad, burned yesterday afternoon and last night. The residents were obliged to fly for their lives, being unable to save anything. There are not over half a do: houses standing in a radius of five miles. The fire is still burning. Gilman's tannery and a saw mill are deman's tannery and a saw min are de-stroyed. The whole settlement was owned by him. Loss, \$100,000. Two railroad bridges are burned. Boston, 2.—There is a report from Port au' Prince that the English schooner Grapple was hurned by the natives at Coy Island and \$10,000 worth of property confiscated, and the crew murdered. A war vessel has been sent there there.

there. Reading, Pa., 3.—The Blue Moun-tains along the northern border of Berkes county are on fire in every di-rection. Serious danger is apprehend-ed. The destruction of woodland is incalculable. No farmhouses are yet burned. The people are fighting the flames.

Detroit, 3.—At an early hour this morning a fire broke out in the building occupied by the Steam Supply Com-pany, and burned for over two hours before it was subdued, and completely gutted that building, containing a bat-tery of twelve boilers and a large amount of coal. The aggregate losses are not far from \$100,000; well insured. Petersburg, Va., 3.—Destructive for-est fires are raging in Wright county, about 40 miles from here. Kingston, N. Y., 3.—Forest fires have been raging here all day. A large quantity of timber has been destroyed in the Catskills, and many fires are ex-tending from West Hurley and Pina Hill.

Hill. Emporium, Pa., 3.—The forest fires in this section yesterday swept over at least 50,000 acres, destroying as far as ascertained four large mills and some thirty-five other buildings, besides an immense number of lumber logs. The people everywhere are fighting fires.
