LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Salt Lake County Horticultural Society is meeting this afternoon, in the City and County building, and fruit growers are invited to attend.

The D. S. university band paraded the streets yesterday afternoon, in advertisement of the track meet today, and created a favorable impression.

Prof. J. A. Whitehead is analyzing soils from Weber, Davis, Salt Lake and Utah counties, in determination of the site for the proposed experimental station in central Utah.

A regular berry, regarded by dealers as a cross between a raspberry and a mulberry, is being received in small quantities from Cache Valley, and is selling at 15 cents a box.

The funeral of Richard Brimley will be held in the Fifth ward assembly rooms, Sunday, at 12 o'clock noon. The remains may be viewed at the late residence, 315 west Sixth South street, from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

The street railway extension on east Fourth Street has been completed, and cars are running regularly on it. The improvement is a great convenience in that it saves many delays in one car waiting for another.

The students in the preparatory department of the State University chose these offices yesterday afternoon for the ensuing year: President, Eggertsen Cluff; vice president, John Richards; secretary and treasurer, Charles Johnson.

Mrs. D. B. Richards is now convalescing at the Gavels, L. D. S. hospital, where she has undergone a series of operations. The friends of Mrs. Richards will be pleased to learn that she is on the way to recovery, and that she will be able to leave the hospital within the course of a few days.

Last night over 1,000 persons visited Saltair, to attend the Cadet dance. The big pavilion was thronged from end to end, with merrymakers, and an enjoyable time was enjoyed by all. The proceeds of the entertainment will return the cadet treasury, and assist in purchasing equipment for the coming encampment.

George Cleland, who is suing Ella M. Robertshaw to recover possession of a deed, which he claims was stolen from him, desires it understood that Mrs. Robertshaw is neither his mother-in-law, nor a friend of the family. He says she is simply an acquaintance whom his wife made a confidant during her lifetime.

One case of smallpox was reported to the health office yesterday. Mrs. Bushnell, who resides at 110 Main street, west First South street, called at the office to have her case diagnosed. She was informed by Quarantine Inspector J. H. Marshall that she undoubtedly had the smallpox, so she was returned to her home and placed under quarantine.

The cadets of the West Side High school and All Hallows college went through the maneuvers of a retreat parade on the West Side and camped out right on the hillside in manner. The buglers called the commands in perfect form, while Capts. Webb and Bassett handled their men in a way that indicated perfect drilling. A large crowd witnessed the maneuvers.

President and Mrs. Joseph T. Kingsbury entertained the prospective graduates of the University of Utah and the State Normal school at the University museum at half past evening. About 10 of the students were present, and all greatly enjoyed the hospitality offered. The spirit of the evening was one of warm love for the Alma Mater, and it is evident that the class will do much for the school, as they go their way through life.

Members of the Deseret Sunday school union board will discuss Sunday school work in the following wards of Pioneer stake tomorrow night: Fifth Ward, Horace Cummings; Sixth George Reynolds; Seventh, W. H. Smith; Twelfth, L. W. Richards; Thirtieth, James W. Ulrich; Camion, George D. Pyer. The visitors will be accompanied by members of the stake board and their talk will be directed to parents particularly. All interested are invited to be present.

Brig.-Gen. Park has issued orders for the season's target practice. Field staff and non-commissioned officers will fire with rifles. Officers will serve with the regiments of their command, as will the privates, and the line officers will also practise with revolvers. Each company commander will appoint a range commander to govern the practice and arrange details. The range at Fort Douglas will be used by the Salt Lake companies Saturday and Sundays, beginning May 20, throughout the summer, and the reports will be turned in next November.

Brig.-Gen. Grierson has returned from Las Vegas where he says there were over 40 buildings put up in 24 hours where previously there was nothing but sage brush and alfalfa. In 90 days the doctor thinks there will be 2,000 persons in Las Vegas. He says the principal banks will be sold out to the speculators. Three banks will do business in Las Vegas, one from Los Angeles and one from Arizona. A \$5,000 hotel is to go up on Second street, and structures for hardware and drug stores, and an assay office are to be erected at once. A church is also promised.

A human skull, evidently that of a white man in middle life, was picked up by two boys in the hills near the Cedar Ranch on the Salt Lake and Tooele road. The boys brought the skull into the city and turned it over last night to Deputy Sheriff Alvin Stout at the county jail. The finders were Alma and Garnet Eddy, and Oscar and William Evans. They located the skull in raising the bottom when out on a mushroom hunting expedition, and after piecing it together found it to be that of a human being, although they at first thought it to be from a

sheep. The police or sheriff's office have no tangible clue as to the meaning of the discovery.
