LOCAL ITEMS.

WILL READ AGAIN.—We learn that there is

FIRE.—Last night after seven o'clock, a stable
belonging to Mr. F. Reich of the Utah House,
situated on 3d South St., by some means not
yet known, took fire and was speedily burned
to the ground. There were a horse and a cow
in it at the time, both of which were saved; and
a quantity of hay was in the upper part which
was consumed. The entire loss is estimated at
from five hundred to six hundred dollars.

SEVENTIES' LECTURES.—Last night Elder Eli
B. Kelsey commenced to lecture in the 13th
Ward Assembly Rooms, but the fire at Reich's
stables suddenly attracted a large portion of the
audience, and the lecture was somewhat ab-
ruptly closed. We learn that Elder John Pack

on Agriculture.

POST OFFICE BOXES.—We call attention to the
Special Notice of Postmaster Street, relative to
increased charges for boxes at the Post Office,
where persons not belonging to the family or
firm that owns a box have their mail matter
placed in it. The price charged for boxes here
is so low that every person, family or firm, hav-
ing a moderate correspondence, should have a
separate box; and the practice which has occa-
sioned this change, is one that never should
have had an existence in justice to the Post
Office here and the gentleman engaged in it,
who by such causes have to do the work of a
first class office, while receiving the salary of a
second class office, it being so rated because of
the lowness of the revenue derived from it.

OBITUARY.

CHAUNCEY WARNER PORTER, who died in
Centerville, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of the
3d inst., was born Oct. 20th, 1812, in Erie county,
New York, and was, at his death, 55 years, 4
months and 14 days old. He moved with his
father to Ohio and Illinois. He obeyed the
gospel, and gathered to Jackson county, Mo.,
in the Spring of 1832, and shared in the persecu-
tions of the Saints. He married Amy Samner
in 1833, and moved to Van Buren county, Mo.,
thence to Lee county, Iowa, opposite Nauvoo,
Ill. He contributed to the building of the Nau-
voo Temple, and was driven in 1846 with the
Saints to Winter Quarters, where he acted as
Ward Bishop; and gathered to these valleys in
1849. He was the pioneer of Porterville, where
he presided over that Branch until he fell asleep
in Jesus, while on his way home, after having
received his last blessings in the House of the
Lord. His remains were interred in Porterville,
Morgan county, on Friday evening, the 6th inst.
