#### Prest, Diaz Receives Delegates and Congratulates Them on Work.

Mexico City, Dec. 4 .- President Dias received the defegates to the Third International Sanitary conference at the national palace yesterday. He congratulated them upon the work of the conference which, he said, had done great good in all of the American countries

William H. Guilfoy, registrar of vital statistics. The records of the health department show that 164 persons died of heart disease during the week end-ing Nov. 30, an increase of 69 over the corresponding week last year. Many of these were meanly most fit pears of f these were people past 65 years of go. corresponding week last year. Many of these were people past 65 years of age. "I ascribe the unusual mortality imong aged persons in New York to several causes," said Dr. Guilfoy, "and the recent flurry in money matters is unquestionably accountable for part of the deaths. Many aged persons have their savings in banks, and such persons, if affilted with chronic heart affection would be very likely to insten their death by worrying. "Another cause is the sudden cold weather, which brings bronchial dis-cases and influenza. Persons past 70 and infants under one year me always seriously affected by pulmonary dis-enses during the first cold weather. Influenza does not affect infacts but it causes many deaths among persons of advanced years. About 60 per cent of patients past 70 years die when at-tacked by pneumonia. This winter seems to bring a larger mortality of aged persons than usual, than there is little doubt that the anxiety of many persons of advanced years over their money has raised the death rate con-siderably."

PARCELS POST.

Chicago Association of Commerce is

Against It.

Against It. Chicago, Dec. 4.-Resolutions againsi the parcels post scheme which is pro-posed by Postmaster-Genera, von Mey-er were adopted yesterday by the ways and means committee of the Chicago Association of Commerce. The pro-position has been under scribus con-sideration by the association since its purposes were unfolded by Postmaster-General von Meyer at a recent banquet of the association. The principal objection to the pro-posed scheme as set forth in the report of the committee was the deficiency it would create.

It would create. The practice of foreign countries, the report contends. "Is no criterion for the United States, on account of the differ-ence in size and density of population." Another objection is that the failure of the scheme to introduce the "zone system" for express companies would give the postoffice the long and un-profitable hauls, which would be in-equitable.

The report avers that the 2,500 sus-taining members of the association and its 40,000 country merchant association members have expressed themselves clearly against the proposition.
