

FINANCIAL BILLS  
WILL FLOOD HOUSEA Dozen Men in Lower House  
Have as Many  
Schemes.

FOWLER IS NOT CONSIDERED.

Trust Prices Are Cut Washington  
Prices Are In-  
creased.Special Correspondence.  
Washington, Nov. 30.—Unless there  
be some cooks to spoil the finan-  
cial bill and too many receipts for  
making the mixture, Congress will  
pass the financial legislation which has  
been talked of so much during the past  
year or four years.Unfortunately there are at least a  
dozen men in the house, each with a  
scheme of his own, and it always has  
been difficult to bring about anything  
the unanimity of action in the commit-  
tee on banking and currency, in which  
body the financial bill must originate.  
But this time it looks as though the  
leaders of the house will pass the bill  
at least on the adoption of a modified  
form at least of the suggestions of  
Secy. Cortelyou. That gentleman has  
been a great deal of thought and con-  
sideration to the outline of a currency  
bill which meets with the approval of  
the financial interests of the country  
as well as of the president. This bill  
will be offered just as soon as the  
committee are appointed, and it is un-  
derstood to be the purpose of Speaker  
Cannon to change the personnel of the  
committee on banking and currency so  
as to secure less blocking and fewer  
complications in that sub-body of the  
house than has been the rule in the  
past. Representative Fowler of New  
Jersey, who was chairman of this com-  
mittee in the last Congress, openly  
attacked the action of Secy. Cortelyou  
in authorizing the issuance of one hun-  
dred million of treasury certificates,  
and his untimely criticism will, it is  
believed, result in his elimination as  
chairman in the preparation of financial  
legislation.

## NO SENATE UNANIMITY.

And yet, while it is possible for the  
leaders of the house to secure the early  
adoption of a currency bill which will  
meet with the approval of the adminis-  
tration, the outlook for the endorse-  
ment of the action of the house by the  
senate is by no means bright.  
There is scarcely a senator who has  
expressed in Washington thus far  
any interest in the bill, and it is un-  
derstood that the divergence of opin-  
ion among the members of the upper  
branch of Congress is as great as it  
is among the members of the house.  
But while the house can be controlled  
by the committee on rules, there is no  
committee in the senate, and even though  
the speaker should be able to get a  
financial bill through the lower branch,  
it may be months before such action  
can be taken by the senate.

## CARTER'S REMEDY.

In the meantime, there are likely to  
be a number of measures proposed not  
to the cure of the financial ills from  
which the country has suffered during  
the last few weeks, but also with a  
view to making runs on national banks  
practically impossible, and this will be  
done by Senator Thomas H. Carter of  
Montana who has introduced a bill  
which would place the depositors of  
national banks under the protection of  
the federal government, and would  
authorize the depositors to sue the  
banks for the full amount of their  
deposits, and with such assurance  
the depositors would never become  
alarmed to a degree sufficient to induce  
them to start a run. Confidence in the  
national banking system would be  
restored, and the country would be  
secure from the financial panic which  
has been so firmly established that the  
million which have existed during  
the last month or six weeks  
would never occur again. Thou-  
sands of millions of deposits have  
been withdrawn and placed  
in safe deposit vaults, old stockpiles  
and bonds with the result that the cir-  
culation has been materially reduced.  
If the depositor of a national  
bank could be assured that his funds  
were safe, he would not be alarmed  
whenever there is a run on the bank,  
and the bank would be able to draw  
on the reserve to the full amount of  
the deposit, and the tax which would be  
paid on the surplus in this in-  
surance fund would be a very small  
percentage of the total amount of the  
deposits.

it is reported that Armour & Com-  
pany have issued a circular noting gen-  
eral reductions all along the line in  
the prices of their products. The Wash-  
ington housekeeper fears it means a  
further increase to them. It is a no-  
torious fact that right here at the na-  
tional capital where the great machin-  
ery is put in operation the citizens and  
sojourners are held up by the retail  
provision trust and compelled to pay high-  
er prices for similar goods than are  
paid by any other city of equal size in  
the United States.

## TO CAPTURE TRADE.

Every year or two the commercial  
people of Washington take a sally  
and decide to branch out to capture  
trade from all the surrounding coun-  
try. This year a committee of the  
Washington chamber of commerce  
has been formed for the purpose of  
attracting the residents of the towns  
and hamlets in Virginia and Mary-  
land to come to the capital for their  
Christmas shopping. Columns and  
columns of matter have been printed  
in the local papers to show how ear-  
nest are the retailers in their determi-  
nation to grab off this trade from  
Richmond and Baltimore. Strenuous  
efforts have been made to raise a fund  
with which to pay back the fare of  
those who come to Washington to do  
their buying, and also with which  
to reward the opening up of an  
office and the employment of a bunch  
of clerks and secretaries who are  
engaged in sending out thousands of  
circulars calling attention to the ad-  
vantages which the capital offers as a  
trading center. The fact is, however,  
that the entire fund subscribed for the  
purpose of would-be purchasers will  
be probably be paid in salaries, in-  
terest and office expenses long before the  
holiday season begins.

## MORE DEMOCRATS.

Senator-elect John Sharp Williams  
who remains as a member of the  
house during the Sixtieth Congress,  
has had several conferences with  
Speaker Cannon during the past week  
with the object of securing more  
committee places for the Democracy  
than there was in the Fifty-ninth,  
and consequently the request of Mr.  
Williams is not unreasonable. It is  
the expectation of the minority lead-  
ers that there will be one Democratic  
member added to each of the prin-  
cipal committees, and this will relieve  
him from a great deal of pressure,  
for Mr. Cannon who has first chosen  
speaker decided to permit the min-  
ority leader to name the minority mem-  
bers of the committees. Needless to  
say, places on the leading committees  
are as eagerly sought by members of  
the minority as they are coveted by  
their more fortunate brothers of the  
majority. It is believed that it is the  
intention of the speaker to make some  
radical changes in the personnel of  
practically all of the principal com-  
mittees of the house.

## PARCELS POST.

Chicago Association of Commerce is  
Against It.Chicago, Dec. 4.—Resolutions against  
the parcel post scheme which is pro-  
posed by Postmaster-General von Meyer  
were adopted yesterday by the ways  
and means committee of the Chicago  
Association of Commerce. The pro-  
position has been under serious con-  
sideration by the association since its  
purpose was unveiled by Postmaster-  
General von Meyer at a recent banquet  
of the association.The principal objection to the pro-  
posed scheme is as set forth in the report  
of the committee was the deficiency  
it would create.The practice of foreign countries, the  
report contends, "is no criterion for the  
United States, on account of the differ-  
ence in size and density of population."  
Another objection is that the failure  
of the scheme to introduce the "zone  
system" for express companies would  
give the postoffice the long and un-  
profitable hauls, which would be in-  
equitable.The report avers that the 2,500 sus-  
taining members of the association and  
its 40,000 country merchant associ-  
ates have expressed themselves  
clearly against the proposition.

## YEAST GERMS IN BLOOD.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—Yeast germs at  
work in the blood have been found to  
be the strange affliction of Leo Kon-  
nel, who is confined in the Cook coun-  
ty hospital and for whose recovery  
there is said to be no hope.It is supposed that the infection en-  
tered his system through some slight  
lesion in the skin of his hands or feet.  
The warm blood furnished an ideal  
condition for the reproduction of these  
germs, and they multiplied at an enor-  
mous rate, so that now a yeast solution  
is running through Konnel's veins.There are said to be only three known  
instances of yeast infection in the blood  
in all the history of medicine. In all  
instances death has followed in a short  
time.Konnel is a Russian Jew and is  
about 21 years old. He is a cooper.

## ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.

Walenski, Man Who Said He'd Pay  
Off Benton Harbor's Debt.Chicago, Dec. 4.—J. W. Walenski,  
who last year announced he intended  
paying off the indebtedness of Benton  
Harbor, Mich., to rid himself of part  
of the \$100,000 he had amassed  
through the discovery of a gold mine  
at Goldfield, Nev., was brought back to  
Chicago last night to face a charge of  
forgery.Walenski, who for five years, was  
employed as cashier by the Butterick  
Publishing company, under an alias of  
J. W. West, is said to have obtained  
\$10,000 through forging the name of A.  
B. Nicholson, western manager of the  
company.He was arrested in New York 10  
days ago as he stepped from a steam-

INCREASES MORTALITY.New York, Dec. 4.—New York is ex-  
periencing its first real snowstorm of  
winter. Yesterday afternoon it  
began and all day and all night the  
snow continued to sweep over the city  
until the streets and walks were cov-  
ered to a depth of a couple of inches.  
Sleighs appeared in Central park for  
the first time during the winter.

## HIG SNOW IN NEW YORK.

New York, Dec. 4.—That a sudden  
increase in the mortality in New York  
is due in part at least, to the recent  
financial flurry, is the opinion of Dr.  
William H. Guilford, registrar of vital  
statistics. The records of the health  
department show that 164 persons died  
of heart disease during the week end-  
ing Nov. 30, an increase of 69 over the  
corresponding week last year. Many  
of these were people past 65 years of  
age."I ascribe the unusual mortality  
among aged persons in New York to  
several causes," said Dr. Guilford, "and  
the recent flurry in money matters is  
 unquestionably accountable for part  
of the deaths. Many aged persons  
have their savings in banks, and such  
persons, if afflicted with chronic heart  
affection would be very likely to  
hasten their death by worrying.""Another cause is the sudden cold  
weather, which brings bronchial dis-  
eases and influenza. Persons past 70  
and infants under one year are always  
seriously affected by pulmonary dis-  
eases during the first cold weather.  
Influenza does not affect infants, but  
it causes many deaths among the aged  
of advanced years. About 60 per cent  
of patients past 70 years die when at-  
tacked by pneumonia. This winter  
seems to bring the largest mortality of  
aged persons than usual, and there is  
little doubt that the anxiety of many  
persons of advanced years over their  
money has raised the death rate con-  
siderably."AXTEROLD, THE STOWAWAY.  
IS ALLOWED TO REMAINNew York, Dec. 4.—Twelve-year-old  
Benj. Axterold is no longer a stow-  
away. After six unsuccessful attempts  
to enter America he has been allowed  
to come in. He is to begin going to  
school at once, and in a few years ex-  
pects to earn enough to bring his  
mother, brothers and sisters from  
Russia to the land of promise he has  
worked so hard to reach. Six times  
Bennie stowed away on Russian ships  
crossing the Atlantic and six times  
he was deported. The seventh time he  
was luckier. Again he was stopped by  
the authorities but just as he was  
about to be sent back for the seventh  
time Hyman Trost appeared on the  
scene. Trost had lived near Bennie's  
home in the old country and knew his  
father. He promptly agreed to care for  
Bennie until he is able to care for him-  
self and the immigration officials re-
