About '10 o'clock this morning one of Pinkerton's detectives placed Fotheringham in a carriage at the Southern Hotel and told him that he he was about to be taken to court, where his habeas corpus case was to be tried. The detective was evidently under instructions and consumed as much time as possible in conveying the messenger there.
