Gray's Lake, Bingham Co., Idaho, Jan. 23.—Our winter is about half gone and we are looking and longing for beautiful spring, although we would like a little more snow, as we have not much more than a foot on the level. We have had considerable wind this winter, but it has been blowing up more than it was last winter by this time.

Mrs. Lydia Muir, wife of Fred Muir, formerly of Salt Lake City, gave birth to a fine first child, Tuesday, Jan. 22. Mother and child doing well.

The Deseret News has now 30 subscribers and still more are looked for, and this, too, from a country that was once considered fit for a few cattle.

Our new justices of the peace, Harry Field, formerly of Salt Lake City, for Gray's Lake, and Wm. J. Hughes, formerly of Franklin, Idaho, for Wayan precinct, are about to be installed in their respective offices.

The people of this valley are soon to have the privilege of speaking through the 'phone to the people of Salt Lake and elsewhere, as a connection will be made in spring to Morristown, Idaho, where the line now reaches, connecting it with Gray's postoffice.

While we have not been able to do much outside work during the winter, enjoyments have not been lacking. Many a dance was given for the benefit of the Relief society.

VICTOR, IDAHO.

Growth and Development of the Teton Country.

Victor, Bingham Co., Idaho, Jan. 22.—Victor is one of the leading towns and settlements of the Teton Valley; it is situated in the south end of the Basin on what is called Trail Creek. This creek is a large, beautiful stream, with many canals and ditches running therefrom.

We have now about fifteen inches of snow on the level, and canyons are well filled, so that the farmers feel satisfied of an abundance of water for irrigation. We have had a beautiful winter so far, lovely sleighing. Men are making two trips a day with saw

logs, from canyon to saw mill. Mr. Ed. Blair will put in a planer in his mill in the spring. Good lumber is \$3 per thousand.

We have had no sickness to speak of, and only one death in this part of the valley this winter. It is surprising to some of our citizens, and built up in the past two years, and still growing. Two new hotels are nearing completion.

Many new orchards will be set out in the spring, as considerable fruit was raised last year. Apples, peaches, and various kinds, and some crab apples, were ripened. Of course, the choice and cream of the country has been taken, but there are still a few more to be made yet. There are a great many sheep and stock being fed in here this winter. Feed is a valued article.

We have some fine graded schools in our district, the maximum attendance being 155 pupils. We have a great many more advantages than one would think for a new country. We have a fine creamery, two implement stores, four general merchandise and two drug stores, three hotels and numerous school houses, meeting houses, halls, postoffices, etc., and still growing.
