In two plants tending to form double flowers, M. Martin Molliard has found that the roots were being attacked by parasitic fungi. He thinks the parasites may have caused the changes in the flowers, and that this discovery may prove important in pratical horticul-

A peculiar breed of domesticated sheep, having goat-like horns, has been kept by natives of the Eunden Oberland, Switzerland, and appears to have been descended directly from the so-called peat-sheep of the Swiss lakedwellings. Alarm is now felt at the present scarcity of the animals. The preed is already nearly exterminated through crossing, and another interest-ing type of animal life will have dis-appeared in a few years unless steps are taken to preserve it.

A new form of Sepollet steam generator, now being introduced in France, is made of cast steel, fused at 1,800 de-grees C., and contains an arrangement of tubes of a bore just large enough to avoid capillary action. In these tube the water is instantaneously vaporized giving a variable pressure of 45 to 175 pounds. Coal, coke or petroleum may be burned, and the generator may be used for supplying a motor, or yielding steam dried at hitherto unknown tem-

The color of tea has been investigated at the Agricultural College of Tokio. In making green tea the leaves are steamed as soon as gathered, while black tea results from fermenting he-fore drying. The black tea contains much less tannin. It is found that the tea-leaf contains an oxidizing enzyme destroyed by moderate heat, and in fer-mentation this enzyne changes the tannin into a brown product.

Mosquitoes and malaria are to be vigorously fought in West Africa by im-proving the drainage, according to Major Ronald Ross. The governors of the coast have become interested in the new ideas upon sanitation, and propose to do everything in their power to des-troy the breeding places of the mosquitoes and to guard against all forms of disease. Even without this special work, disease may be expected to dim-inish with the present rapid development of the country, as it did in India and Burma after their occupation. Red light is claimed by a German physician to be an effective remedy for

pimply eczema as well as other skal diseases. Even when of long standing, the worst cases were cured by four hours' exposure to sunlight, covered only by a red cloth. A new discovery in antiseptic surgery is receiving the attention of Prof. Gussenbauer, of the Vlenna University. In spite of the usual antiseptic precautions, healing after several operations was retarded by socalled "gas abscesses," and investigation showed a new bacillus, found also on the ceiling and one of the walls of the room. Peculiarties of this organism are that it develops only when oxygen is ex-

cluded and that it generates gases dur

ing its growth. The development of new colonies depends largely upon soft wood, for telegraph and railroad lines, mine-timber-ing, buildings, and other purposes. Hard wood is too difficult to work, while in tropical climates the soft wood is quickly destroyed by ferments, worms, in-sects and other agencies, and M. Louis sects and other agencies, and M. Louis Balmes suggests that an important part of the future equipment for settling hot countries will be a portable apparatus for rendering wood antiseptic. Woods treated with creosote or sulphate of copper have proven very durable for railway sleepers. Several antiseptic prosesses are—whether economical or not—to inject the protective substance into every part of the wood.

The anthropological collections at Yale Uninversity are stated to comprise from 15,000 to 20,000 specimens, chiefly archaeological, and they represent georitories, Hawaii and the Philippines, be-sides forty foreign countries. More than 3,000 antiquities are from Cenornaments from Chiriqui. There are over 1,000 pieces of Missouri pottery. Recent additions represent the Quater-nary and cave deposits of western Europe, the Swiss Lake Dwellings and the shell heaps and dolmens of Scandinavia. Physical anthropology is illustrated by several hundred skulls mostly from Pacific islands.
