More Wages Offered Canners.

Chleago, Nov. 5 .- Representatives of the packing interests at the union stock yards have offered the striking

stock yards have offered the striking sausage makers and canners an in-crease in wages that probably will be accepted by the employes, preventing a general strike in all the centers of the industry. At a conference between the super-intendents of the plants and the officers of the Amaigamated Meat Cutters and Butchers' unlon, the men were told

of the Amaigamated Meat Cutters and Butchers' union, the men were told that the packers consented to raise the wages of all the sausage makers to a minimum scale of \$1.75 a day, but refused to lift the pay of those getting more than that amount. They de-clared they are willing to set the same standard in the canning department, which would mean a general increase which would mean a general increas

which would mean a general increase of about six per cent. When the strikers meet today to vote on the proposition of the firms, the officers of the meat cutters will urge them to accept it.
