

TWO MURDERS STAGGLED LONDON.

Delegates to Armenian Congress
Are Shot Down in Cold Blood
By Unknown Man.

HE THEN COMMITS SUICIDE

Did This When He Could Not Escape
—His Identity Not Established
And May Not Be.

London, Nov. 4.—The dramatic murder of Sargis Sargis, president of the Armenian revolutionary society in London on the night of Oct. 25, was followed this afternoon by the assassination of two more delegates to the Armenian convention here. The suicide of the assassin, though he has not yet been identified, gives good reason to believe that he also was the slayer of Sargis.

The murders were carried out in the most daring manner, more so than was the assassination of Sargis. They took place in the early afternoon, close to the Armenian headquarters at Peckham. The two victims were shot down from behind at close range. The murderer fired twice at a third member of the group, but missed him, and then attempted to flee. Seeing that his escape was cut off he drew another revolver and shot himself with his left hand. It is considered a significant fact that the assassin of Sargis was also left-handed.

The names of the murdered Armenians were Agran Grigorian and Sigran Semikian. Their companion, who escaped assassination, was Ruben Chabirian. It is believed that the identity of the assassin may remain unsolved unless he has been previously in the hands of the police, when the scars on his face may render identification easy.

A member of the Armenian revolutionary committee said tonight to the Associated Press correspondent: "The murderer is undoubtedly an Armenian, but he is not one of our people. He looks like a man from the interior districts." The costume of the assassin was of a curious nature. A new light overcoat and a new black derby hat gave him a respectable exterior, but his serge suit was extremely ragged and his shoes were much worn. His shirt was shabby, while his underclothes were new and of fine quality.

In his pocket he carried a cloth cap, apparently that said to have been brought by the slayer of Sargis on the night of the latter's assassination. It was much too large, and its size had been reduced by several rough stitches. It is evident that the plan of the assassin in making his escape had been to discard his overcoat and the derby hat and to wear the cap, which would have given him the appearance of a respectable street loafer, but, his escape being cut off, he determined to commit suicide, rather than to submit to capture.

This series of crimes in a hitherto quiet suburb has brought terror to the Armenians, who fear to leave their houses except under police protection.

The police, while believing that the murderer of Sargis and the assassin of the Armenians today are identical, fearing a continuation of the murder-vendetta, point to the ease with which the assassin escaped them after the killing of Sargis. It indicated, they say, that the murderer was harbored and given another set of clothing by accomplices.

A prominent police officer said tonight to the Associated Press: "We are utterly in the dark regarding this case. Heretofore we have looked upon the Armenians as an inoffensive class, and have not coupled them with the nihilists or anarchists, with whom we are well acquainted. There is not a man in Scotland Yard who is at all familiar with the Armenians in London. We do not know where to begin in the work of unraveling these well-arranged and successfully-carried-out killings."

AN ITALIAN'S DEED.

Dominick Reolandoe Murders
Two Men in Butte.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 4.—James Holland was murdered about 6 o'clock this evening and John Sullivan, also known as O'Neill, was mortally stabbed about 8 o'clock. The murderer being an Italian named Dominick Reolandoe. After the tragedy the Italian made his escape and has not yet been found.

The terrible affair occurred on Lexington hill. Reolandoe used a pocket-knife as his weapon. He had been drinking during the day and got into a fight.

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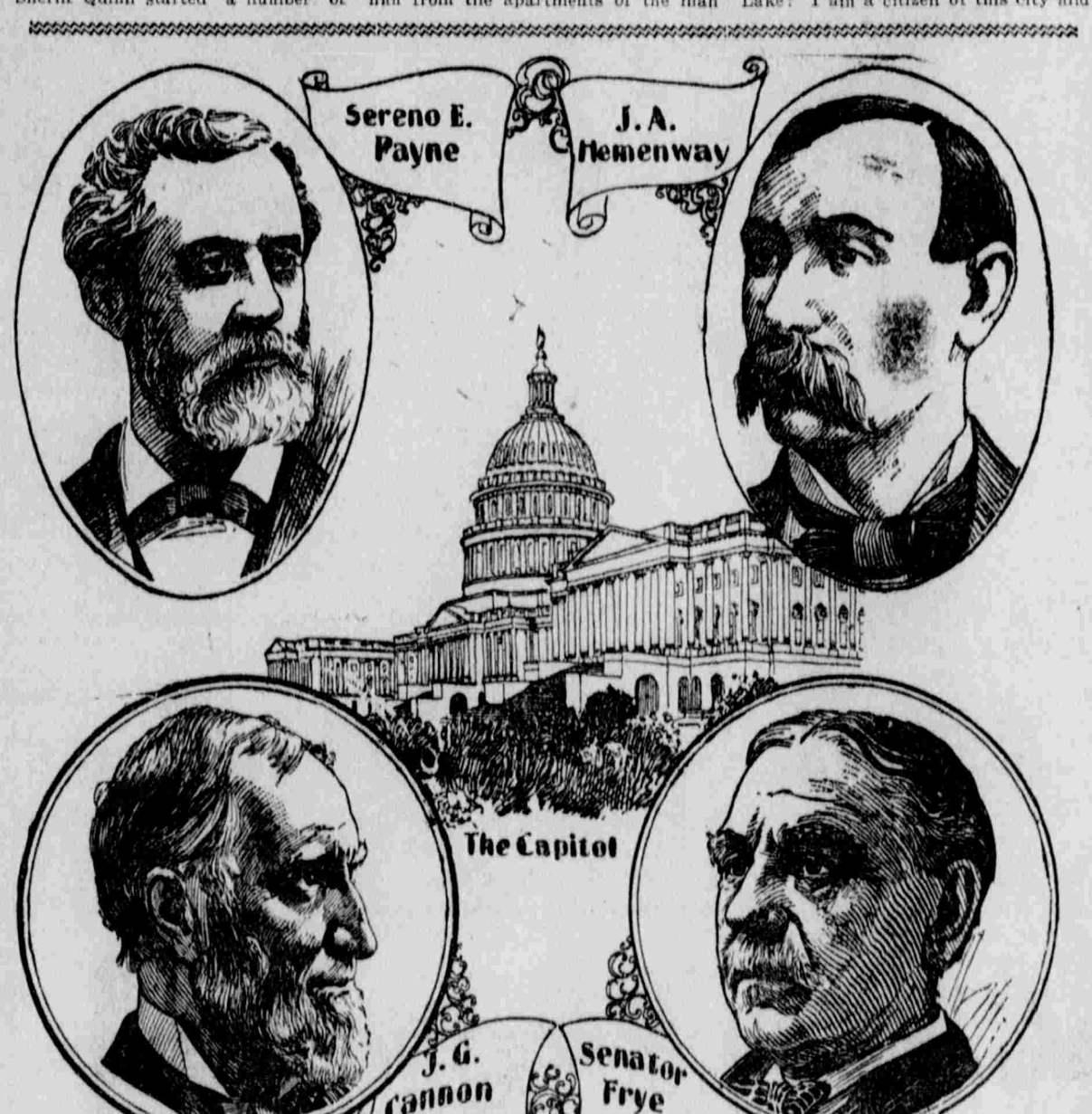
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THE SPECIAL SESSION OF THE FIFTY-EIGHTH CONGRESS.

N. Y. POSTOFFICE.

Inspectors from Washington Begin a Rigid Inspection.

New York, Nov. 5.—Under specific orders from Washington it is stated that the inspectors who have been here several days have begun a rigid examination in the affairs of the New York postoffice.

The inspectors are said to have obtained copies of the payrolls and the names and addresses of every employee for the purposes of investigating each particular case and learning all the dates of first employment and all details as to term of service and the merit system employed that resulted in promotion with increased pay.

Postoffice Inspector Frank E. Little is in charge of the corps of investigators, and with him are Inspectors Holmes and Snow of Cincinnati, Farrell of Chicago, Pendleton of Boston, and Thomas of San Francisco. The investigation probably will continue for several weeks.

Portland Wants Legislature Called

Portland, Ore., Nov. 5.—The Portland city council has adopted resolutions asking Gov. Chamberlain to call an extra session of the legislature to draft the laws which will permit the collection of taxes for the year of 1903. Unless an extra session of the legislature is called, Portland will be without means of meeting her obligations and under the terms of the city charter the city is forbidden to increase its indebtedness.

Falling Off in French Recruits.

New York, Nov. 5.—A falling off in the number of French recruits this year by 34,000 draws attention to the depopulation of the country, says a Paris dispatch to the Times. An extra parliamentary commission is advocating reforms calculated to lighten the burdens of the parents of large families, improved sanitation in order to reduce infant mortality, change naturalization, and a revision of the law of inheritance diminishing the portion left to the eldest son.

Clara Coffin's Disappearance.

New York, Nov. 5.—Much excitement has been caused among the residents of East Orange, N. J., by the mysterious disappearance of Miss Clara J. Coffin, daughter of a New York broker. The girl was a leader in the younger social set of the Oranges and had been studying quite hard to keep up with her classes in high school, where she was to graduate this year. The school authorities believe her mind has been given under the strain of overwork.

Miss Coffin left her home early Tuesday evening, presumably to go to the home of a friend in a few steps distant. She never reached that place and no trace has been found of her since.

There is a family of the Coffin family residing at Newcastle, Ind., but it is not thought that Miss Coffin had money enough with her to reach that place.
