REP. G. A. LOUD **MAKES A DENIAL**

Repudiates the Story Told by His Former Private Secretary, Frank Edinborough.

NOT INFLUENCED BY ANY ONE.

Has Always Voted for What His Judgment said Was Best for the Naval Service,

Washington, April 6 .- Representathe George A. Loud of Michigan today denied before the special house committee investigating charges against the Electric Boat company that he had complained bitterly that W. G. Gordon of his district, an attorney of the company, had "borne down' ppon him in the matter of submarine legislation, as testified to Friday by Frank Edinborough, formerly his private accretary. He said Mr. Gordon wate secretary. He seld Mr. Gordon had not done so nor had he in any way threatened him with political op-position; neither had he urged upon him the subject of marines. Mr. Loud I said that when he had learned of Mr. Gordon's employment by the Electric Boat company he had ex-pressed extreme regret that Mr. Gor-don had accepted comployment with the company. company

He also denied knowledge of caus-fing a letter or telegram to be written as testified to by Mr. Edinborough, inas testified to by Mr. Edinborough, in-forming Mr. Gordon of his action in committee in voting for submarines. He also had expressed regret while on a trip on the Dolphin to a number of congressmen, among whom were Mr. Lilley, that the Electric Boat company had employed an attorney in his district. No one had ever infi-mated to him, he said, that Mr. Gor-don would become a candidate against bin if be did yot yote for submarines. him if he did not vote for submarines. Mr. Loud said he had never been influenced by any one outside the nainducated by any one outside the ha-val affairs committee. "but have al-ways," he continued, "noon my own judgment votel for what I deemed best for the naval service and my duty as a member of that committee" Chairman Boutell called attention to the fact that affidavits, letters, etc. presented to the committee but not

presented to the committee, but not made public by it, had been published in the newspapers.

This course is understood to have been taken because of the action of Mr. Lilley in making public certain documents he had presented to, the

documents he had presented to the committee. Robert W. Wolley, a Washington newspaper correspondent, became hi-volved in a controverse with Repre-sentative Lilley as to the accuracy of the statement made by Mr. Wolley on the statement made by Mr. Wolley on the statement made by Mr. Wolley on the stand regarding certain interviews he had had with Mr. Lilley. A flat contradiction was made by Mr. Lilley and Mr. Wolley as emphatically maln-tained his position. Both gentlemen répeatedly took the stand in contra-diction of each other's testimony, and Mr. Wolley's remarks became so per-sonal that the committee halted him.

EXCHANGE OF FELICITATIONS.

At Dinner Given by Admiral Charles M. Thomas on Board the Flagship Minnesota.

Magdalena Bay, April 3, (via San Diego, Cal., April 6.)-The relations between the American naval officers and the Mexican authorities, represented in chief by Gov. Augustin Sanguetin of Lower California, since the battleships steamed into Magdalena bay, have been most cordial and mutually pleasant recollections of the stay will be carried away by all who have participated in the friendly functions that have marked the last three weeks. At have marked the last three weeks. At a dinner given last night by Admiral Charles M. Thomas, in temporary com-mand of the fleet, on board the flagship Minneosta, the exchange of felicitations was characterized by extreme cordial-ity and gracefulness of compliment. Admiral Thomas made a brief address in which he commented upon the Admiral Thomas made a brief address in which he commented upon the friendly relations existing between the United States and Mexico, and ex-pressed the belief that the stay of the fleet at Magdalena bay will do much to cement that friendship into perma-nency. The address coming at the time when the relations of the two coun-tries informally are being discussed was tties informally are being discussed was most significant and apparently was highly appreciated by the Mexican guests on board the Minnesota, Admirals guests on board the Minnesota. Admirals Sperry and Emery were among the American guests. Gov. Sanguetin also was very happy in his remarks, de-claring he believed that Mexico and the United States had been brought nearer together than ever before by the warmth of the friendship existing be-tween President Diaz and President Roosevelt. Admiral Thomas in his ad-dress said:

"We of the Atlantic fleet are fully appreciative of the privilege so cor-dially granted by your government to utilize the waters of this magnificent bay, the ideal place on the Paeific coast for the gunnery training of the Ameri-can navy, and on behalf of my own government, I return to you our grate-ful thanks for this highly prized con-
