The Arizona Mission.—We have been permitted to peruse a letter from Elder Daniel W. Jones, dated Aug. 24, from Ula, Arizona. The little company living there, were all well, and together with their Lamanite associates, performing a good work. The latter had worked hard and industriously, 3,000 sacks of wheat having been raised this season. It was the intention to enlarge the irrigating ditch soon, when, if sufficient help was furnished, ten times as much grain could be raised.

Elder Jones experienced much care and anxiety in correcting the errors and faults of the Lamanites, whose benighted condition was, normally, such as to discourage as yet one but a servant of God, bent on the discharge of his duty. A redeeming trait of their character, however, was their willingness to be taught. Many were very exemplary, honest, industrious and virtuous. Their children, several of whom were being continually busy in making suitable clothes for that purpose.

A Sunday School had been in existence from the beginning of the settlement, and was now under the supervision of Brother Daniel Jones, Jr. Some of the young people among the Lamanites, who could read in the first and second readers, had evinced a desire to join the Sunday School if they could get books. The letter closes with a request that Brother Goddard would present this last subject before the Sunday Schools and their friends in this city, so that means might be donated to procure a few suitable books and have them sent for that laudable purpose. We are confident our Sunday Schools will respond promptly.

Dead.—Willard H. Davis, the young man who was injured at the depot yesterday, died about half-past four o'clock last evening. At the time of the accident he was between two flat cars of a moving train, engaged in coupling them. Some one called upon him to descend, and while coming out from between the cars, he was struck by the brake bar, thrown across the track, and dragged some distance in his prostrate condition, until, catching upon a hog of the track, the wheel passed over him, crushing and mangleing his body terribly.

From the time of the accident until his death, he remained perfectly conscious, and was able to converse with those about him.

The deceased was not only a fine specimen of health and power physically, but was noted among his friends and acquaintances for his strength of will, his kind heart and his many noble qualities. A short time ago he received more than a touch intoxicating liquor in any shape. Immediately after the accident he was pressed to take some brandy in order to sustain him, but he declined to touch it, assigning his promise as a reason for his refusal. His departure is mourned by a very large circle of relatives and friends. May God bless and strengthen his sorrowing parents.

Returned.—Sisters Eliza R. Snow, M. L. Horne and Elizabeth Davis, who have been traveling for a few weeks through northern Utah, in the interests of the women's cause, returned to the city last evening. Sister Snow started from here with Sister Davis on the 6th inst., and traveled in Cache and Box Elder Counties, promulgating the cause of relief societies and the principles of the Primary, and X. L. M. I. movements.

Returning to Ogden they attended the Relief Society Stake Conference, and were there joined by Sister Horne. The three then visited Morgan County, holding meetings of two sessions in nearly every settlement, and organizing X. L. M. I. Associations in West Porterville, Riverville, and Paradise. They then proceeded to Summit County, where they visited three settlements. At Echo and Handeferville new relief societies were organized, and in the former place, at the request of the Bishop, the sisters occupied one Sunday evening in place of the regular meeting. The people, generally, were much interested, and turned out in large numbers to receive the instructions of the sisters. We bid the ladies welcome home.

Artisan Well.—At 2.30 p. m. today, the well was six feet deeper than when boring was commenced with the new machinery. A bed of quicksand has been reached, and it is the previous rapid progress. Mr. Pierce states that quick-sand is far preferable to the sand, as the latter not only retards the action of the pump, but also tends to the cavity so soon as to prevent the descent of the piping.
