Awarded by Board of Education To Asper, Noall & Company.

TO LOWEST BIDDER. NEXT

supt. Bridewell Gets Increase of Salary of From \$1,800 to \$2,000 Per Annum.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board of education last evening, Vice President H. P. Henderson in the chair, the firm of Asper, Noall & Co. was awarded the contract for the construction of the now school building. which is to be erected the present season, on Tenth West and Fourth North streets. The company mentioned was the lowest qualified bidder, and it was explained that the firm that bid lower, the Great Western Mill and Building company, had failed to accompany their estimate with a certified check, and had further refused to give a bond, which is a requirement of the resolu-tion asking for bids. The price named the last named company was \$32. 144, while the bid of Asper, Noall & was \$41,200.

Co., was \$1,200. After considerable discussion of the matter, during which many questions were asked and answered, by various members, it was unanimously agreed that the contract should be given to Asper, Noall & Co. Mr. Giauque urged necessity of proceeding without de-to the construction of the proposed lding. This in view of the fact ilding. that the price of material as well as the price of labor is steadily advancing, with prospects that they will continue to increase for some time to come. The sooner the building is under way, the better it would be, suggested Mr.

For the same building, Midgley Bros. received the contract for plumbing, on a bid of \$2,740, and the contract for heating goes to Carthey & Dumbeck for



REPORTER FIRED OUT.




