The eastern train was seven hours late at Ogden last night. The Utah Central did not wait.

The work of putting down a new stage in the Theatre, will commence as soon as possible after to-night's performance.

The District Court opened this morning at the appointed time, but no business was transacted. It is in session this afternoon.

Many of the prisoners sentenced in the Second District, recently, had wives, children, mothers, and lady friends, who were at the County Jail to bid them farewell, on their departure for the Penitentiary. Great crowds of people gathered around to witness the scene, which made it appear like a funeral.

**Hymeneal.**—We congratulate our young friends, Mr. Timothy J. Winter and Miss Aggie Cowan, on their union to-day in the holy bonds of matrimony. We trust that the sun of true affection may always beam upon their path, and that the fruit of Winter may prove in their case as precious as those of any season of the year. Mr. Winter has been several years with Mr. Isaac Sears, the popular grain dealer. He is favorably known to all who have done business with that firm, and both bride and bridegroom belong to respected families of this city.

**Suicide by Poisoning.**—From Mr H. P. Miller, a Richfield correspondent, we learn of the suicide by poisoning, at that place on the 11th inst., of Stephen or, as called by some, Stephanus Moss, a citizen of Richfield. He had, for several years, suffered much in body, and at times was subject to painful fits. Between 11 a. m. and 12 m. of the date above given, he told his sons he had suffered long enough, and pouring out some strychnine in his hand, was about to take it when one of his sons, perceiving his rash intention, knocked the deadly drug from his palm. The father immediately poured out some more, and ere he could be prevented, swallowed it. He died in about 30 minutes afterwards.

**A Painful Experience.**—Yesterday morning, Joshua Adams, 14 year old son of the late Barnabas Adams, and a brother to Miss A. A. Adams, the actress, met with a painful accident at the family residence in the First Ward. He had added a horse to take a ride, and was in the act of mounting, having put one foot in the stirrup, when the animal sprang forward, throwing the young man to the ground, and as he held tightly to the bridle reins, dragging him some distance through the yard. Mr. Daniel Adams, an older brother, who was sitting inside the house, saw the mishap from the window, and rushing out, seized the horse by the bit, checked his wild flight and saved his brother from serious, if not fatal injury. As it was, the animal reared up and came down with both his front feet upon the shoulders of the prostrate boy, who was lying upon his face, the caulk of the iron shoes entering the flesh and inflicting painful wounds. It was, however, that no bones were broken, and ere long, after his injuries had been dressed, the young man was feeling comparatively comfortable.

**Interesting Extracts.**—We have been permitted to make the following extracts from a letter from Elder John W. Taylor, dated Dawson City, Terr. Co., Georgia, March 28th, 1881:

"It was a great change for me to come so far away from home, and meet strangers, who have so many peculiar ideas and customs among them; but I am becoming used to these things now, and do not notice them so much as I did at first."

Brother Matthias F. Cowley and I have been laboring together in opening up new fields of labor, and our Heavenly Father has blessed us very much in our endeavors to spread the good news. Friends have been raised up to us on every hand; and where one meeting house is closed against us, two or three new ones are opened; so that it makes no difference how people try to oppose us, it is always sanctified to our good. Our meetings are generally crowded and often a number have to stand out of doors. We are being invited into new localities, and in order to fill all our appointments we have to separate. Brother Cowley holding meetings in one place and I in another on the same day. We are 200 miles further south than any of our Elders have ever preached in this State, but we have received a letter from Brother Morgan advising us to move northward during the hot, sickly summer months, so in accordance with his instructions we propose starting north in about two weeks.

Through the blessings of the Lord many are becoming interested in the truth, and they treat us as kindly that I do not like to leave them; but I suppose it will all be for the best. At present we are holding about four or five meetings each week, and the Lord blesses us in speaking to the people, and if many do not get baptized at present, our words will be like "Bread cast upon the waters to return again in many days."

I have gained 25 pounds in weight since I came to this country, so you see, through the blessing of God, the climate agrees with me. It is now warm weather here; everything is in blossom. There are no mountains as in our country, but great forests and many large swamps, where the alligator makes its home. The atmosphere is very damp.

When one man, or group of ten, friends are raised up by the Lord, so you see He blesses us according to our day. We try to be as wise as serpents, and as harmless as doves."

**Honoring a Veteran.**—Brother E. H. Blackburn, of Minersville, writes on the 12th inst., of a pleasant affair which took place there on the 9th inst., in the shape of a birthday surprise party to Father Charles Jameson, one of the survivors of the "Hann's Mill" massacre, who is now 77 years of age. He still carries the lead with which he was shot on that memorable day, when 17 of our brethren were slaughtered and thrown into a well. Brother Jameson received four bullets at the time. It will be cheering to his many friends to learn that, although quite feeble, he is standing the tolls of life very well, considering all he has passed through, including the exodus from Nauvoo, and service in the "Mormon Battalion," and is still strong in the faith. Quite a number of brethren and sisters met to celebrate his anniversary, headed by C. A. Burk, one of the Pioneers of 1847, and after the usual congratulations, at 3 p. m., set down to a sumptuous dinner. After dinner, a lively conversation took place, over old times and the many experiences of the past, in which Brother J. took part. All enjoyed themselves first rate, and at 6 p. m., after a hearty hand shaking all round, with renewed congratulations and good wishes, the company dispersed. Our correspondent adds: "The health of this place is good. All nature seems to smile, after the fine rain of last week. A fine prospect of fruit here the coming season—farmers are jubilant over the prospect for grain."

**More Habeas Corpus.**—We clip the following from the *Enquirer* of Wednesday:

"Reference was made in our column a few days ago to a case of unlawful liquor selling in Mount Pleasant, wherein one A. O. Nyborg was fined by the city justice \$75 and costs, for violation of the city ordinance regulating the sale of liquor. Defendant, after this judgment was rendered, applied to the First District Court for a writ of *Habeas Corpus*, which was granted, and yesterday the matter came up for hearing before his honor Judge Emerson. Without proceeding further into the merits of the case, the defendant was discharged on the ground that no commitment had been issued, that the proceedings were irregularly signed, in that the defendant, signed as Mayor, ex-officio Justice of the Peace, instead of Justice of the Peace.

In rendering his decision, his honor remarked that the papers and proceedings in this case were so illegal and irregular as to leave him no alternative but to grant the writ of the defendant. Impressions were apt to be formed to the effect that he would not sustain the city ordinances, but the defendant's presence was formed, but defendant had rights that they were entitled to exercise when proceedings in justice's court were irregular, and he must recognize those rights. Cities, however, had authority to pass ordinances, and it was the duty of the courts to enforce them when the cases arising under them were in accordance with the law. His honor was ready to recognize the regularity of cases in the lower courts, and that these cases came before him for adjudication, but he could not recognize irregular proceedings such as had transpired in this case."

**Not Yet Obtained.**—The 200 men called for, to work on the Denver and South Pass Tunnel of the Union Pacific Railroad, have not yet been obtained. Applications are being handed in quite slowly, for some reason. It was thought there were enough men unemployed in this locality, who would jump eagerly at the chance of labor offered at \$2.50 per day guaranteed, and that the demand would be supplied immediately, but such does not seem to be the case. So much building is going on here just at present, that workmen are much more scarce than they were a month or two ago. Still there is no doubt that the 200 men for the Union Pacific Company will be procured within a few days. The names handed in will be passed upon and a force of good, reliable men selected therefrom. Superintendent Sharp informs us that as soon as he has 100 men that will suit him, he will organize them and send them to the field of operations. The tunnel is on a branch road of the U. P. Company, and is of sufficient extent to insure the job's holding out well.

**Dividend Declared.**—At a meeting of the stockholders of the 20th Ward Co-operative Store, held last evening, a dividend of \$1 on each share of the capital stock for the last half year, was declared. The business of the meeting was under the direction of Bishop John Sharp, president of the institution. The store is in a prosperous condition.

**Jack Emerson.**—John McConnell, otherwise Jack Emerson, indicted for complicity in the murder of John F. Turner, for which crime Hope was sentenced several days ago, will have his trial in the Third District Court, about the 25th inst. His attorney has obtained permission to issue subpoenas for witnesses in his defense at the public expense, and also leave to transcribe certain portions of the evidence in the Hope trial, to be used for the same purpose.
