-------SIZE OF AN ATOM. How large is an atom? "Perhaps the simplest, though not the most ex-act way of arriving at a rough estimate of the size of atoms is by measuring the thickness of a soap-bubble film, where it is us thin as possible, just before it bursts," says a writer. "Such a film, if composed of atoms, must be semething like a pebble wall. Now, a pebble wall would not stand if it were not sveral pebbles thick, and if we had reason to suppose that it was about a dozen pebbles thick, we could easily make an estimate of the size of the pebble by measuring the thick-uess of the wall. "That is the case of the thinest re-sion of a soap film, It is found to have a very definite and uniform thickness. It is the thinnest thing known, and by refined optical means its thickness.
