Passed Away at His Home in Marriott's on Saturday-Was a Weber County Pioneer.

Futeral Tuesday, at 11 a.m. in Marriott Siceting House-Program Formulated for John Marshal Day.

Simon F. Halverson, one of the pioneer settlers of Weber county, died Saturday evening at 7 o'clock, at his residence in Marriotts, Weber county, at the age of 71 years. The deceased was one of the most prominent and highly respected citizens in the State. He had been in ill health for several months, but his death came as a severe shock to his family. He was the father of five sons and three daughters, County Attorney George Halverson, Fred, James, Charles and Samuel Halverson, all of Ogden; Mrs. T. Farr, Mrs. J. W. Owen, of Logan, and Mrs. R. M. Wright of Pocatello.
