

ZELAYA READY TO SAIL AWAY

Reported to Have Made All Arrangements to Leave Nicaragua With His Family.

CENTRAL AMERICAN JUNTA.

Headquarters in Washington Where it Surrounds Itself With an Air of Mystery.

New Orleans, Dec. 5.—According to private reports received today from Managua, President Zelaya has made all arrangements to leave Nicaragua with his family on the first steamer sailing from Corinto. The report is discredited by persons here who claim to be in close touch with Zelaya.

CENTRAL AMERICAN JUNTA.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The Central American Junta, composed of diplomats and patriots from the five turbulent little republics on the neck of land between Yucatan and South America, is one of the latest acquisitions of the capital of the United States. While it has been meeting regularly ever since Secy. Knox sent his famous letter to President Zelaya of Nicaragua, telling him to be good, it has managed to shroud itself in mystery. The junta is working steadily on plans that have to do with the future of the little states washed by the Caribbean sea.

It is unofficial, but vociferous. Its sessions are held in the cafe of a leading hotel much frequented by South and Central American diplomats and the policies of the Central American states are threshed out daily and nightly.

The junta is the clearing house for all information that leaks unofficially from revolution-torn Nicaragua and the diplomats have framed up a half dozen new alignments of the five republics, each with a view to the equitable distribution of the balance of power.

Among the members of the junta who daily gather at the appointed place are Federico Mejia, minister from Salvador; J. B. Calvo, minister from Costa Rica; Luis Toledo Herrarte, minister from Guatemala; Luis Lazo Arriaga, minister from Honduras; and Luis P. Corea, former minister from Nicaragua.

In addition to this distinguished group there are Luis Adderson, former minister of foreign relations of Costa Rica; Senor Don Luis Felipe Carlo, minister from Ecuador; Dr. Salvador Catriello, special agent here for the Nicaraguan insurgents; Anibal Cruz, minister from Chile, and a score of attaches from the various Latin-American legations.

Debate are carried on in Spanish. Once in a while some excitable member of the party will raise his voice, accompanying his high-pitched language with very gesticulations and thumps upon the table. Then it is the "elder statesmen" of the junta take charge of affairs.

"H-e-t-t" "H-i-s-t-t" they say in unison. "Carramba. It is not that this is a market place."

Secy. Knox's letter to Zelaya has been read and reread by the diplomats until practically every member of the junta has committed it to memory.

KING GUSTAV CARRIES COAL FROM LIGHTER

Stockholm, Dec. 5.—King Gustav on Saturday inaugurated a new departure for sovereigns. Disguised as a stevedore he spent most of the day carrying sacks of coal from a lighter.

In an interview after it was all over, the king said that was only the beginning. He intended to mix with all classes of laborers so that he might ascertain their opinions and wishes. Already, he added, he had obtained many valuable hints from men with whom he worked.

The determination of King Gustav to learn of the condition of the workmen by mingling with them and taking part in their labors has resulted from the recent great tie-up of the business life of the country by a general strike. King Gustav intervened last August in an endeavor to obtain a compromise, but without avail. The strike continued for months and involved thousands of men.

Eventually arbitration was undertaken by the Swedish government, and in the interim many workmen returned to their tasks, although the number of unemployed remained large.

King Gustav and other members of the royal family contributed to a national fund raised to make loans to the working classes. Conditions remain such as to cause his majesty grave anxiety.

The king found difficulty in ascertaining the real facts, and in the last week or two had made arrangements to join various laborers at their work in such a guise that they would not recognize him.

MORE EFFICIENT DIPLOMATS WANTED

Secy. Knox Evolves Plan to Improve Personnel and for Betterment of Service.

WILL GRADE SECRETARYSHIPS

Advancement Will be From Lower to Higher, Demonstrated Ability Will be the Test.

Washington, Dec. 5.—To improve the personnel and efficiency of the diplomatic service and to encourage secretaries of legations to qualify for promotion to the rank of ministers, President Taft has approved a plan suggested by Secy. Knox, and he published it tonight as an executive order.

The new project provides for a board of examiners to pass upon all applicants for appointments as secretaries and prescribes the standard to be maintained.

Secy. Knox, in a letter submitting his plan to the president, points out the remarkable growth of the political and commercial relations of the United States with foreign nations and the increasing difficulty of the problems to be dealt with.

Records of efficiency of all the under-secretaries will be preserved in the state department and appointment from outside the service to secretaryships will be made only to the class of third secretary of embassy; or in case of higher vacancies of second secretary of legation; or of secretary of legation at posts which have assigned to them only one secretary.

Vacancies in secretaryships of the higher classes in the future will be filled by promotion from lower grades, and efficiency and ability demonstrated in the service will be the tests of advancement.

All the secretaryships in the future will be graded according to the importance or difficulty of other aspects of the work done at each mission, and these classifications will be made known to the service, so that every man may know just where he stands.

The examining board, to consist of the secretary of state, the solicitor for the department of state, the chief of the diplomatic bureau and the chief examiner of the civil service commission will determine the fitness of candidates designated by the president for examination.

The examinations will be held at Washington and will be both oral and written. Knowledge of these subjects will determine the fitness of the candidates: International law, diplomatic usage, at least one modern language other than English—either French, German or Spanish—the natural, commercial and industrial resources of the United States, American history, government and institutions, and the modern history of Europe, Latin-America and the far east.

In the oral examination candidates must demonstrate alertness, general contemporary information, natural fitness for the service, address, command of English and general education. A physical examination will be supplemental.

Candidates must be between 21 and 50 years old. From the successful candidates an appointive list will be prepared and from this the candidates will be chosen.

The department will aim to apportion representation fairly among states and territories.

UNIFORM AUTOMOBILE SPEED LAWS WANTED

New York, Dec. 6.—An effort to obtain uniform automobile speed laws throughout the various states of the Union will take up a share of the time of the national conference on uniform legislation to be held in Washington next month.

The matter will be brought before that body by the officers of the National Civic Federation, according to an announcement made here today. In the announcement it is noted that the maximum legal speed is 20 miles an hour in 14 states; 25 miles an hour in seven other states, and 15 miles an hour in
