

Air of Mystery.

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New Orleans, Dec. 5 .- According to private reports received today from Managua, President Zelaya has made all arrangements to leave Nicaragua with his family on the first steamer sailing from Corinto. The report is discredited by persons here who claim to be in close touch with Zelaya.

CENTRAL AMERICAN JUNTA. Washington, Dec. 5.—The Central American junta, composed of diplomats and patriots from the five turbulent little republics on the neek of land be-tween Yucatan and South America, is one of the latest acquisitions of the capital of the United States. While thas been meeting regularly ever since Feex, Knox sent his famous letter to President Zelaya of Nicaragua, telling him to be good, it has managed to shroud itself in mystery. The junta is working steadily on plans that have to do with the future of the little states washed by the Carribean sea. It is unofficial, but vociferous. Its sessions are held in the cafe of a lead-ing hotel much frequented by South and Central American diplomats and the policies of the Central American ustates are threshed out daily and nightly. The junta is the clearing house for all information that leaks unofficially from revolution-torn Nicaragua and the diplomats have framed up a half dozen new alignments of the five republics, each with a view to the equitable dis-tribution of the balance of power. Among the members of the junta who fadiy gather at the appointed place aro Federico Mejia, mirister from Salva-dor; J. B. Calvo, minister from Costa Rica: Luis Toledo Herrarte, minister from Guatemala; Luis Lazo Arriago, minister from Hondurns, and Luis F. Corea, former minister from Nicara-gua.

In addition to this distinguished group there are Luis Adderson, former minister of foreign relations of Costa Rica; Senor Don Luis Felipe Carlo, minister from Ecuador; Dr. Salvator Catrillo, special agent here for the Nicaraguan insurgents; Anidal Cruz, minister from Chile, and a score of at-taches from the various Latin-Amer-ican legations. Debates are carried on in Spanish. Once in a while some excitable member of the party will raise his voice, ac-companying his high-pitched language with fiery gesticulations and thumps upon the table.
