BUSY DAY ON MINING EXCHANGE

Dullness Displayed in Eastern Market Centers Not Reflected Here.

COLORADO IS SOME LOWER.

Tintie Stock Sells Down to \$3.10-Black Jack Holds Strong-Closing Quotations.

While the volumn of trading on the floor of the Salt Lake Stock & Mining Exchange was not as heavy as that of yesterday, the trading was brisk, which is explained by the sales sheet showing that more than 75,000 shares were transferred, and that the value of the same amounted to more than \$40,000. Colorado starting out with sales at \$3.20, dropped to \$3.15, then recovered to \$3.17½ and finally ended up with the stock being bought at \$3.10. Uncle Sam Consolidated weakened off to 67 cents, or a decline of 2 cents a share above the opening sale figure. Black Jack was bought at 50 cents; afterwards at 48 cents, while Beck Tunnel Consolidated went at 80 and 82 cents. Seven Troughs held steady around 31 cents; but South Columbus saged to 64 cents.

F. A. Heinze's interests in Butte are now limited to his stockholdings in Davis-Daly and whatever interest he has in La France, says a correspondent writing from Butte. He has just lost his remaining banking interest, amounting to 60 per cent of the stock of the State Savings bank. The bank suspended last October, after Heinze is said to have drawn \$200,000 out of it in a rutile effort to sustain himself in New York.

The State Savings bank re-opened last week, but it did not do so until it was given out that Mr. Heinze had been eliminated. The elimination is not yet complete, however, though he has lost all control and voting power in the bank. He owes the State Savings bank some hundred thousands of dollars, and he gave to M. S. Largey, president of the bank, an option on his 60 per cent of stock, the option carrying with it the voting power, and being for one year, ports, out of some 200, from which they were requested. Among those who have paid no attention to the com-munication of the exchange are the Consolidated, Florence and a number of other big ones. Under the laws of the exchange, the directors may strike from the boards any company which falls to make the desired report. The exchange desires information as to the property, finances, officers, etc., of all the companies whose stock it lists, both for the protection and informa-tion of investors, and for the guidance of the exchange itself, and feeling that these data are for the benefit of all concerned, the directors consider that they are justified in insisting on them.
