Beale made an interesting report of the Relief society class for nurses, and stated that applicants can enter a class now on payment of \$10 by the Relief society of their ward, and a signed contract to give 40 days' free work under the class auspices at call of Supt. Emma Empey. Another change in the class work necessitates the free work to be given within a year instead of two, as before.

Mrs. Beale also referred to the new quarters secured for the class and stated that there were now 40 Relief class nurses in the field.

Interesting addresses were made by Mrs. Ida Smoot Dusenberry and Mrs. Minnie H. James. The first address was by Mrs. Dusenberry, who spoke on "The Relief Society and the Church," and the second by Mrs. James, who spoke on "The Relief Society and the World."

POLITICAL NOTES

James F. Turner, assistant to Prof. John Hays Hammond as national secretary of the National Republican League, with headquarters at Wash. D. Mr. Pelt stated that the opinion among those affiliated with the Citizens' movement is strongly in favor of commencing a vigorous campaign for a ticket that can be endorsed by the Democrats and the Republicans, as well as "Americans" who want an honest business administration.

Those familiar with the situation claim that the American party leadership have obtained the pledge of the saloons to deliver 5,000 votes in that party. The saloons and gambling element, however, are not to be trusted generally, and are against a Citizens' movement for honesty and morality.

SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

A striking connection between alcoholism and tuberculosis has been brought out by Jacques Rodiere in a set of maps based on the latest French statistics. The maps show that in the north of France the consumption of brandy per inhabitant is much greater than in the central and southern portions, and that the line of separation corresponds to that of the limit of wine culture. In wine-growing regions the use of brandy is small. The phthisis map agrees very closely with the alcoholism map, and indicates that the use of brandy and other strong alcoholic beverages gives conditions specially favorable for the development of tubercular disease. Phthisis among saloon-keepers, moreover, is more than twice as frequent as among other merchants, the yearly deaths being 175 and 215 respectively in 100,000. In Paris phthisis is twice as common among males as among females, and this also seems to be due to the fact that alcoholism is chiefly confined to men.

Benson of the medical department of the University of Utah will give an address this afternoon to the principals of the public schools.

New Irrigation Scheme—E. Warren Steed filed application yesterday afternoon, with state engineers for permission to build a dam on Price river for storage of water to irrigate 60,000 acres of land. The dam will be 600 feet long and 140 feet wide, impounding 65,000 acre feet of water.

Try to Find Charles Holmes—Word was received at police headquarters this morning from Logan, asking that the police here locate Charles Holmes, of the Temple city, as his little daughter died there. The mother, who is a widow, is unable to find him, and every effort is being made to locate him.

COURTS PUT SALOON OUT OF BUSINESS

The Majestic Theater Company obtained an injunction against John Baer prohibiting Opening Establishment.

The Majestic Theater company obtained an injunction against John Baer, a saloonkeeper, at 70 east First street, this morning, which was granted by Judge C. W. Morse, prohibiting him from opening up his saloon in violation of the city ordinance which declares that it shall be illegal for a saloon to be within 50 feet of any place of public amusement. The members of the city council are secured for violating the laws that they passed in granting Baer a license above the protest of the theater company. They are charged with bad faith and an effort will be made to obtain the revocation of the license.

The Majestic Theater company protested against the granting of the license on Aug. 29, 1909, but the council paid no attention to the communication, the complaint charges. Again on Sept. 25, 1909, the manager of the amusement company sent a protest to the council and cited the ordinance which made it illegal for a saloon to be within 50 feet of a place of public amusement. The council is charged, granted the license without considering the protest. The council granted the license on the ground that the saloon had been operated there before the theater company was organized.
