A BOOTBLACK ARRESTED

He then used language that would not be used by a dog, and was severely flogged and turned over to an officer. He pleaded guilty and was given five tugs in the city jail.

THE GRAND JURY REPORT.

The grand jury came into court shortly after 10 o'clock and reported having found seventeen indictments—fourteen under the law of the Territory, and three under the law of the United States. They had ignored the following charges: R. M. Ellsworth and T. J. Hansen, assault with a deadly weapon; Carrie Simpson, conspiracy; Edward Holliday, attempted poison; D. B. Carson and Peter Roman, conspiracy; John Stroh, mail box; McElrath, embezzlement; Horace Cummings and L. Knudsen, false imprisonment; Wm. Nelson, theft.

THE SOCIAL EVIL.

The ten females who had been indicted for keeping houses of prostitution in this city were all exonerated by Justice Zane. The majority were on trial, but several of the offenders failed to respond, and as they were not represented by anyone, hence were waived. The trials came down varying from \$25 to \$200 were imposed.
