FOREIGN.

BRITISH BRICS.

LONDON, 20.—The House of Commons continued in session until 2:30 Sunday morning. The supply bill was finished, and the Irish tramway bill passed its third reading. The government assured Parnell and his followers of only 25,000 devoted to emigration purposes. The debate was very bitter throughout. In addition to Bigger, O'Connell and Newlands were called to order by the speaker.

Thirty-two persons died from cholera in Alexandria Saturday; one British subject, Roger Beede-Vaughan, Catholic, New South Wales, died suddenly in Liverpool yesterday.

Wm. Writ Sykes, United States Consul at Cairo, and husband of Olivia Logan, died Saturday.

Rioting was renewed at Port Bridge to night. The police were attacked, whereupon the rioters were readied and the police charged the mob. A number of Catholics severely beat two Protestants, one of whom is lying in a serious condition. Fifty rioters were arrested.

One hundred and eighty-two deaths from cholera in Egypt Saturday, including 100 in Egypt, and three deaths from cholera in the provinces of Ghazal and at Fe the 1st of day.

The Queen goes to Balmoral on Friday. Her health is much improved.

The Times Alexandria correspondent says: "If the British troops should be withdrawn from Egypt, no European family would remain in the country a week after their departure. Egypt, he says, is incapable of self-government."

The report that the bombardment of Haifa had been denied. The French will for the present occupy the forts commanding Haifa. It is said that the French will send a detachment to Haifa, and if rejected, blockade will be proclaimed.

A shooting affray occurred at Sandridge. A man evicted named Dennis Shaw has been arrested on the charge of having shot a police man.

General News.

Paris, 20.—The doctors state that the end of Count de Chambord has been rapidly approaching the last 24 hours.

Rotterdam, 20.—The Emperor of Germany, accompanied by the King of Romania, reviewed the guards here.

Dr. Gustav Wernher, celebrated for his travels in Africa, has been appointed General Surgeon for the St. Petersburg, 20.—There have been anti-Jewish outbreaks in Polog and Rostov. The disorders were promptly suppressed, and the police and the military are actively inquiring into the causes of the rebellion.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

San Francisco, 19.—A Sacramento dispatch states that the Board of Education increased the assessable value of taxed property in California for the present year, 1893, and a half million dollars.

El Paso, Tex., 20.—El Paso is determined on having an American Exchange Exhibition, to be held some time next year. The citizens are taking it up warmly. It is expected it will be a great success.

Atlantic City, N. J., 20.—The vessel reported lost off Beach Haven carried the signal of distress and not the black flag. The steamer in pursuit was an American steamer, and by the signal, she remained at the place half an hour to rescue the crew of the sunken vessel.

Chicago, 20.—John R. Walsh, a Chicago contractor, has bought a controlling interest in the Chicago Herald, the latter to be the Western organ of "Fidens," should the latter come into the hands of the Western News Company. M. J. Ryan, editor of the Chicago Times is to be editor.

Chicago, 20.—Mackey announced the early construction of a post office to San Francisco, and connection with all the large cities. Two new cities have been proposed in the Western Union office here.

St. Louis, 20.—The continuance of the violation of the Sunday law before the Court of Criminal Correction during the past two weeks seem to have increased the confidence of the saloon and small shopkeepers, and more beer and wine saloons and small shops were reported tonight, kept open to-day.

Gov. Callahan, who returned home from his Western trip yesterday, seems to be quite indignant at the course of the saloonkeepers here, and asserts very emphatically, that the law must be enforced. It is necessary he will send the Attorney General down here to assist the prosecution of cases now before the Court.

Philadelphia, 20.—It is expected a strike of printers will break out here. Work is suspended in all the factories for the summer, but the strikers have been ordered to return to work in September. The manufacturers, however, insist upon a reduction in wages. In some instances as high as 10 per cent. has been demanded. It is expected that they will strike rather than submit to any reduction. The glass workers here are according from the Knights of Labor and joining the American Glass Workers Union.

The chimney glass blowers and painters have already secured and together will meet next Sunday. They will draw up and enter the same organization.

Reporting an Agricultural Meeting.

About the first newspaper work seen by Huntley, the "Spoon-tyke" of the Brooklyn Eagle did was on the New York Tribune when Greeley was its editor. His main assignment was to report a convention of eminent agriculturists.
