



Petersburg Quit Work On Orders.

DICTATORSHIP IS COMING.

Grand Duke Nicholas to be Made Commander-in-Chief of All Troops.

-

St. Petersburg, Aug. 4, 2:45 a. m .- St. Petersburg is in darkness tonight. The employes of the electric lighting plants, always the carliest harometric record of political conditions, ceased, work during the afternoon, in obedience to the call for a general strike. This call already has been obeyed by 2,000 factory hands in the capital. It will be impossible, however, to predict the success of this universal political sirike until Monday, as the workmen in St. Petersburg and the provinces have two holidays, Saturday, which is the fete day of the downger empress, and a great religious feast, and their regular

holiday of Sunday. The only other available index to the situation are the railroads. Up to 2 o'clock this morning the railroad men have not heeded the call for a general strike, except in the case of an insig-nificant hobtall line running to Sectionetzk and other short resorts in the vi-cinity of St. Petersburg. The men of this road barricaded the line, with the result that they had an important col-

lision with Cossacks last night. In the meantime the fate of the Stalypin cabinet sways in the balance, and Russia is upon the verge of disorders which may lead either to the reign of

the military or the proletarian. It can be stated definitely that the step toward a dicutorship may be taken Sunday or Monday by the non-ination of Grand Duke Nicholas to the chief command of all the troops in Russis. This would virtually place him in control of all the disturbed districts of the empire where martial law has been prachtimed.

This matter was a subject of earnest discussion during the Interview be-tween the emperor and Premier Stolypin yesterday, from which the premier ceturned in greatly vexed state of mind The revolutions at Sveaborg and Cronstadt and the mutiny on board the cruiser Pamyatazova gave the tone to the conversation between his majesty and the premier. These events, al-though they have all ended fortunately apparently have left a strong impression upon the mind of the emperor. The Associated Press has been informed from a high source that the nomination of Grand Duke Nicholas to the post of commander in chief, if made, will be announced as "for the purpose of hatmonizing the activity of all troops without reference to political affairs," out Premier Stolypin is scarcely dised to regard the nomination in this

SET JAIL ON FIRE.

Prisoner Who Did it Perished in the Flames.

Oakland, Cal. Aug. 4 - An unknown risoner set fire to the town jail at Niles early this morning, in an endeayor to escape, and before the blaze could be discovered or help arrive, was burned to death. It is not known how the

man started the fire, but if is presumed that he had some matches concealed about his person, which the officials in searching his clothing overlooked. After he had started the blaze, he could not keep it within bounds, and was soon the victim of his own device er escape. His screams of pain aroused neighbor, Frank Stoddard, who quick trought eitlzens to the rescue, finmes had then gained such headway, that no one could reach the prostrate body of the prisoner, and his body continued to burn before their eyes. All joined in extinguishing the flames, the only houses burned being the jail and a few other outhouses.

The half-burned body of the man was this morning taken to the coroner, who holding the body pending identifica-The man had been arrested last night

on a charge of vagrancy, and was the only prisoner in jail.

A PREMATURE EXPLOSION.

Bomb Intended for Troops Killed Intending Murderers.

London, Aug. 4 .- A dispatch to the Evening Standard from Moscow says that a number of workmen there today had propared to receive with bombs a detachment of troops sent against them when one of the bombs was prema-turely exploded by accident and exploded other bombs, blowing three workmen to pieces and wounding many others.
