Bro. Huntsman was born Oct. 8, 1806, in Belmount County, Ohio. He was living in Indiana when he read the Book of Mormon, and believed its authenticity. He removed with his family to Far West, Mo., where he was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, on the 15th of April 1838, by Elder David Evans. He was banished from his home in Missouri by the exterminating order of Gov. Boggs, and located in Nauvoo.

He was ordained to the office of Teacher on the 26th of Feb., 1840; served in that office until the 6th of October, 1845, when he was ordained into the Seventies and placed in the 12th Quorum, and afterwards in the Presidency of the 18th Quorum.

Br. Huntsman was one of the guard at the

Temple while the workmen were finishing that building amid the rage of mobs.

On the exodus of the Church from Nauvoo br.Huntsman served as one of the pioneer guard as far as Richardson's Point, and was honorably discharged by Duncan McArthur. He then returned for his family, and, while laboring in the field to procure the necessary means, was taken by the Hancock County mob and barbarously whipped, in company with A. N. Hill and WITH SLINGS AND FIFTY ROUNDS others, who suffered the like cruel treatment. Hearrived in Great Salt Lake City in 1851, and located in Tooele County, where he resided until called on the "Dixie" mission in the fall of 1865.

Br. Huntsman was one of the honorable men of the earth, raised an honorable family, and Each Gun. has departed in full faith of the gospel and a resurrection with the just. Like the Patriarchs of old, he blessed his children, and charged his stalwart sons to be firm and faithful in the Kingdom of God.
