

SQUIRES-BURNS GETTING READY

Great Deal of Interest in Their
Battle Scheduled for the
Fourth.

MEASUREMENT COMPARISON.

Figures Show That Canadian and Australian Are Pretty Evenly Matched—Squires Makes Friends.

As the date of the Burns-Squires fight draws nearer day by day interest in the battle increases and the difference of opinion as to the outcome becomes more pronounced. Both fighters are gaining friends and those who have watched carefully the work of the old Australian pick him to defeat the Canadian.

Burns did a good stroke of business with Coffroth when he signed the articles of agreement. He insisted on a side bet of \$5,000 and Squires then forced the management to agree to give him \$5,000 with loss of draw. But Burns is out for the winners and if he can land it, and he is working faithfully to condition himself for a grueling contest. He has supreme confidence in his ability to defeat Squires and those who have watched Burns at work in his training quarters express the opinion that he will win.

The Australian has made many friends during his stay in San Francisco. He works hard and has little or nothing to say. He has been extremely obliging to the newspaper men in looking for them that they might "get a line" on his ability.

FINISH TRAINING.

Yale and Harvard Crews Now in Fine Shape.

New London, June 23.—The oarsmen of Yale and Harvard have finished their long five months' training and will regatta today on the Thames river next Thursday.

Physically there is little, possibly no choice between the crews. Harvard has the same magnificent power in her various parts that she had last year, and the close of her hard practice shows no indication of the faults which have been pointed out until this past week. The Yale boat with far more strength in it than last year, has developed a form which experts look upon as the acme of perfection.

Both crews are more evenly matched, in the opinion of experts, than any which have met for many years. Their condition is the result of the longest, hardest period of training recalled at either university.

EMPEROR WINS RACE.

But Held Religious Services Before The Contest.

Kiel, Germany, June 23.—Emperor Wilhelm conducted religious services before the imperial yacht Hohenzollern at 9 o'clock this morning. Afterward he sailed the Mecklenburg to victory over the Hamburg, which gave up the race. In the half mile the Mecklenburg covered the thirty-three knot course in three hours, twenty-two minutes and fifty-three seconds.

The American-built yawl Nahavah in her class beat the Mecklenburg in twenty-two minutes and ten seconds. The emperor on board the cruiser Munich went outside the harbor for some distance to observe the maneuvers of one of the new submarines. It has not been learned whether the emperor went down in the submarine personally.

Ambassador and Mrs. Tower, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carnegie, Lord and Alison V. Armour and other visiting Americans, took tea with Prince and Princess Heinrich of Prussia at the castle this afternoon.

Emperor William dined with Mrs. Robert Carnegie at the castle this afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Carnegie were among the guests. The Prussian government has provided a special car for Mr. Carnegie's journey to The Hague. Accompanied by his wife, he will leave at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning for the Prussian government has arranged with the Holland government for the car to go through by the most rapid route, three changes thus being avoided.
