A session of the city council was held last night. The principal item of business was the consideration of the new ordinance being prepared by the special commission. W. K. Bennett represented that he had made arrangements for the running of the Provo City Railway during the summer, but he understood the franchise at the road last season forfeited. He asked for the privilege of operation until November 1. The matter was referred to the committee on streets and alleys. The appointment of Dr. George Smart as quarantine physician of the city was confirmed.

Railroad Accident.

The Illio Grande Western passenger and mail train was twelve hours late yesterday. A rumor got circulated that an accident had happened. The railroad people would neither affirm or deny the rumor, maintaining their usual reticence. When the train arrived, information was obtained from the passengers in the effect that the engine and its engine and passenger coaches got loose from the other part of the train, crossing a switch at a place called Lower. The engine ran through a Chinese track between the track and finally landed in a ditch. The baggage and express car of the other portion of the train met a similar fate. The passengers were a general shaking up and an all round scare, were unharmed.
