POCATELLO, IDAHO.

Opening of Fort Hall Reservation -"The Chicago of the Rockies."

Pocatello, Idaho, June 18 .- The opening of the reservation is already bearing fruit here, and a young boom is sprouting. Many people have sup-posed that the whole of the Fort Hall reservation would be thrown open for settlement, this is not so, as it reaches from Parineuf nearly to Blackfoot. Only five miles north and west or one corner will be open when the President shall issue his proclamation. But there is enough to make Pocatello the Chi-cago of the Rocky mountains. The menwho laid out this town had no idea of its future. Its streets are so narrow that a wagon can hardly turn, with alleys suitable only for wheelbarrows, and side walks five feet wide. One gentleman said, looking at the narrow ways: "I was in Salt Lake City a few weeks ago, and I nearly lost myself on her streagt and reard side walks." Yes her streets and grand side walks. Pocatello will imitate Chicago in more ways than one some day. Then a great city will be built up on the ground that was only a way station just fourteen
