

for the worse was apparent, and this continued until twenty-five minutes past 7 o'clock last night, when the sufferer passed away.

Many of his friends visited his bedside during his closing hours, and at the time he died all his children, save one, were present. This was Sister Josephine Smith, now with her husband, Apostle John Henry Smith, in England. He died at the residence of his son John, where he has been kept during his final week of illness. The cause of his death, as stated above, was nervous prostration, a general physical collapse, the natural winding up of a career noted for its unceasing activity and energy.

Brother Groesbeck has not been really well since his wife died last December. The loss of his beloved partner was a heavy blow to him, and one from which he did not recover. About six or seven weeks ago he complained of a severe pain in his head, which deprived him of sleep, but his indomitable will would not let him be convinced that he was not well enough to be out, and he kept on until a week ago, when he was seized with a fainting spell and has since been confined to his bed. He had the best of care and attention, but his hour had evidently come. His vital force was exhausted and the busy wheels of life stood still.

Nicholas Groesbeck was the son of Harmon Groesbeck and Mary Bovee and was born at Buskirk Bridge, Rensselaer County, New York, September 5th, 1819. His grandmother was a Van Rensselaer, from which family his native county was probably named, and on that side at least, if not on his father's also, he was of German descent. He was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in March, 1837, by Elder Swett, and afterwards moved to Springfield, Illinois, where he met and married on March 25, 1841, Miss Elizabeth Thompson, his companion for so many years, and whom he survived but six months. While living at Springfield, he went on the bond of the Prophet Joseph Smith, who was tried there on a trumped-up charge in the year 1842. He never lived at Nauvoo, but paid frequent visits to that city. He was engaged there in coal mining and contracting.

He emigrated from Springfield in 1856, arriving here on the 2d of October. His earliest experience in and while on the way to Utah, was in the managing of the B.Y. Express. He was conducting a train of goods over the plains when he passed a division of Johnston's army, then on the march westward to "exterminate the Mormons." Brother Groesbeck got his train through in safety, though he had to cache some of his goods in order to do so. He filled a mission to England, upon which he started in 1866, and not long after he got back was called on another mission to the United States, from which he returned in 1869. He was a member, at the time of his death, of the 24th Quorum of Seventies.

He was engaged here in merchandizing and mining to some extent, but acquired his wealth mainly in the purchase, improvement and rental of real estate. He was an eccentric man in some respects, but kindhearted, charitable, conscientious and upright in his dealings. His predominant characteristic was his great energy, and it was no doubt his hard-working habits that tended to shorten his life. Surrounded by affluence, he was strictly temperate and frugal in his habits, and though given to the acquisition of wealth, he administered to the poor and needy with an open heart and an unsparing hand. He was held in esteem by a wide circle of friends, was true to his God and his religion, and lived and died universally respected.

The funeral services will take place from the Seventeenth Ward, Assembly Rooms, to-morrow (Tuesday) at 4 o'clock p. m. The friends of the family are invited to attend.

Previous to engaging in teaching each instructor must

before the County Board of Examiners and present before a board of trustees of the district where he expects to teach a certificate signed by the said Board of Examiners, which shows his actual standing as a teacher and an indorsement of his moral character. Recently a three days' examination was held in Provo. Supt. G. H. Brimhall, Prof. J. M. Tanuer and Miss Nettie Southworth conducting. The object was, three days thou shalt labor and prove what thou knowest; if thou knowest not thou canst not teach; if thou knowest and can prove it, thou mayest teach. The whole business was conducted methodically, courteously and impartially.

During the past school year the

##### COUNTY TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

held ten sessions in Provo. The work accomplished having been previously programmed by a special committee from among the members. Following is a list of the subjects in their order as presented: Lectures, mental philosophy, etymology, syntax, orthography, geography. Five lessons in music; five lessons in general history; three lessons in physiology and hygiene; ten lectures in drawing. Essays: Progressive teaching, grading of district schools, daily recitation and weekly reviews, object teaching, physical culture, examinations, objects of teaching. In addition to the above was the invaluable query-box wherein questions of direct interest were deposited for answer at the next regular session. This association will ever feel indebted
