The committee appointed for the purpose went to Ogden at an early hour this morning and meeting the visitors at once took them in charge. These having been introduced, sociable intercourse was the order of the hour until the train pulled up in this city, the visitors without exception being affable and communicative, evidently disposed to pick up all that can reasonably be gathered while here and not at all averse to giving something from their own localities in return when desired. Of course it is an intelligent aggregation; their calling itself, even in the absence of other evidence, would be conclusive on that point; but we may say in addition and without hesitation that our present callers are in some respects in advance of similar previous ones.

Tomorrow they will drive over the city in Raymond and Utah coaches, tendered by the Grant Bros. Livery Co., leaving the Continental hotel at 9 a. m. Photographs of the party will be taken near the Temple. They will attend services at the Tabernacle at 2 p. m. Excursion to Fort Douglas at 4:30 o'clock via Salt Lake City Railroad company. United States military band concert at 5:30. In the evening they will attend a concert at Calder's park. Visitors desiring to make the trip are tendered the freedom of the Rapid Transit line, which leaves the Theatre corner every twenty-two minutes.

The limited time at the disposal of the party, in view of the foregoing programme, did not afford much of an opportunity for friendly gossip. Dinner was of course the first desideratum with most of the company, and this disposed of, preparations for the trip to the lake were in order. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education met in regular session September 3rd, Vice President Nelson in the chair. The members present were Messrs. Duke, Pratt, Pike, Newman, Baldwin and Young.

SITES AND BUILDINGS.

Jacob Weiler offered to sell to the board a lot adjoining the present school grounds in district No. 3 for \$6500. Committee on sites.

Peter Sinclair offered to lease to the board two large rooms on Seventh South at a rental of \$50 per month. Committee on sites.

Adam Spiers, a representative of the Tenth Ward Ecclesiastical Organization, offered to sell to the board the lot adjoining the school site in the Tenth Ward, with the building thereon, for \$10,000. Committee on sites.

A BUILDING RENTED.

The committee on sites recommended that the use of the school building used in North Salt Lake be discontinued. The committee reported that arrangements had been completed with Albert Davis for a building in Campe's lane, west of the river, for \$100 for the ten months ending June 30, 1892.

OTHER BUILDINGS SECURED.

The brick dwelling in Earl & Roberts' addition on the east side of the Jordan had been secured for \$100 for ten months ending June 30, 1892.

A frame building in Folkome's addition had also been secured on the same terms. The committee recommended that the offer for the leasing of the Hooper building be accepted. Adopted.

THE BOARD'S FINANCES.

The committee on finance reported that it had no further information in regard to the sale of bonds. In reference to the loan of \$10,000, previously reported upon, the committee represented that having to pay interest on the full amount from September 1, and not needing to draw the full amount for sixty days, it had deemed it advisable to arrange to take up the loan made for \$3000 and thereby save paying double interest on the amount, and should it need that sum later on it could get it on the same terms. A resolution providing for the taking up of the loan accompanied the report and was adopted. It is as follows:

Resolved that the Utah Title, Trust & Insurance Company be and they are hereby authorized to take up the warrants of the Board, numbers 1593 to 1671 both inclusive, amounting to \$2966.75, now held by the State Bank of Utah, and hold the same subject to the redemption by the treasurer of this Board as soon as he shall have funds on hand sufficient for this purpose, and that this amount shall be paid by said company out of the 10,000 arranged for. Said warrants have been stamped by the paid stamp of "The

State Bank of Utah," and cancelled by them, and that a copy of this resolution be attached to said warrants as authority for this action.

CERTIFICATES.
