

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—Miss Ince will make her second appearance here to-night in the title role of the beautiful and classic play of "Evyadne." There is so much to excite admiration and respect in this drama, for the virtuous indignation manifested by Colonna at the indignity cast upon his family honor and the blow aimed at his sister's chastity, and the unselfish purity of Evyadne's heart and thoughts while moved by the deepest touch of love, that it cannot but ever be a favorite with all lovers of the beautiful and pure. It is excellently cast; and from the exhibition of ability already manifested by Miss Ince, there is no question but her impersonation of Evyadne will be chaste, natural and touching. With this splendid actress in the title role, Mr. McKensie as Colonna, Mr. Lindsay as Ludovico, and the other parts well cast, the performance will be a most appreciable entertainment.

**AN AFFRAY IN COURT.**—The Helena Gazette gives a description of a "brawl" between two members of the Helena bar, Mr. Chumasco and Col. Woolfolk. The affray took place in the court-room at Helena, on Friday evening last. Col. Woolfolk demanded that Mr. Chumasco should take back a statement made by him (Mr. C.) derogatory to the good name of the Col. (Mr. C. not being willing to retract his statement, the Col. assaulted him with a cane, which was broken in several pieces. Mr. Chumasco struck out lustily in his defense. There was a pen-knife in the hand of Col. Woolfolk during the struggle with which the breast of Mr. Chumasco's coat was cut. The officers of the court intervened and separated the combatants. The judge decreed that Col. Woolfolk be fined one hundred dollars, and be imprisoned for thirty days for contempt of court. It was claimed, however, by Woolfolk and Toole, that this exceeded his jurisdiction, as the statutes of Montana provide that the fine shall not exceed fifty dollars and confers no power of imprisonment on the judge.

A motion was made to set aside all portions of a fine exceeding fifty dollars.

This was certainly a peculiar scene for a court room.

**EXCITED.**—Various and sundry parties, more noted for ardent temperaments than strict attention to the governing rules of veracity, are manifesting a degree of excitement, altogether unwarranted under the circumstances, concerning the description of the Bear Lake monster, by our esteemed friend, J. C. R., and endorsed by Mrs. C. C. R. The Bear Lake monsters are the advantage of some nearer this point in origin, though not being so well known; hence, probably, the reason why the veracious individuals alluded to are excited. We know monsters who are so familiar to the public that no one now thinks of calling them by their right names; but these Bear Lake monsters are the genuine article, of original texture, the great distinguishing characteristics between them and the others alleged to be, we think, their massive size and lack of speech. We sustain the tangibility and reality of those mysterious denizens of Bear Lake.

**SUICIDE AT BOISE.**—The Democrat of the last day gives an account of the suicide of a man named David Martin who, for some time, had been slightly deranged. His friends had been making arrangements to send him to his relatives in the east, and had watched him closely for some weeks. On the morning of July 30th the people in the house where he lived were aroused by the report of a gun. They discovered Martin lying within a few feet of the house. He had shot himself in the abdomen. He declared that he had killed himself to be free from his misery. He was a native of Virginia.

**COMING WEST.**—An exchange says that Schuyler Colfax will arrive in Denver within a few days.

**HAY.**—The Cheyenne Leader of a late date expresses the hope that the rains falling in that region would improve the hay crop, which was likely to be a light one. The hay crop in the best hay producing lands in some parts of this Territory, is likely to be a very light one, not from the absence of rains, but from the destruction caused by the locusts. In some places in Morgan, Summit and Wasatch counties, the hills which usually afford excellent pasture are all but bare, and in spots altogether so; while the hay crop is seriously injured, unless there should come rains to wash the virus of the insect off it, and give it a fresh start. Will our brethren be careful of their hay, and knowing its increased value under the circumstances, not sell it for less than it is worth?

**THE IMMIGRATION.**—By telegram to President B. Young from General H. S. Eldredge, dated to-day at Omaha, we learn that six hundred immigrants left that point last night for Benton, Bro. Eldredge will leave to-night. All well.

**SALT.**—The Winnemucca Argonaut speaks of a salt marsh in Humboldt county, Nevada, that covers a tract of five thousand acres, and says, "If there be any saving grace in salt, Humboldt can supply a host of salvation." Salt Lake is not a whit behind any other place either for salt or salvation.

**SETTLING A TITLE.**—The Reese River Revue of the last inst., has the account of a "slight contention," which occurred near Cortez, with regard to the title to a hay ranch, in which one man was killed and another wounded. This amiable mode of settling a difficulty resulted from two men named Walker and McCluer claiming the ranch in question, from which McCluer had cut hay last year and Walker attempted to cut hay this year. McCluer threatened Walker, and the latter on going to the place on the 29th ult., to cut hay, saw some object moving in the grass, when remembering what he had heard of the other's threats, he returned for his pistol. McCluer got behind a haycock, armed with a Henry rifle, and on Walker returning, fired at him. Both fired several times, resulting in Walker being shot three times, once in the forehead, which caused instant death; and McCluer being shot twice, once in the leg and once in the thigh. McCluer was arrested and held for trial. Such a speedy and effective mode of settling difficulties entirely dispenses with the slow and tedious process of courts of justice; and is probably an adjunct of that "higher civilization" which we are so often told to expect. We would rather get along without it.
