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## THE LEE TRIAL.

Address of Judge J. G. Sutherland,  
of Counsel for the Defense, to  
the Jury, in the District  
Court, Salt Lake City,  
August, 1875.

(CONTINUED.)

Are Smith and White such witnesses?

They are not likely to be better witnesses, nor better men,

than they represent themselves. Let us

consider the facts for a moment as they have exhibited themselves.

First, Philip Klingensmith. He informs you that in 1857 he was a

bishop of the Mormon Church at Cedar, having no local superior,

except Isaac C. Haughton, was president of that State. As bishop
