CURE FOR OBESITY.—Mr. Schindler is the latest addition to the list of persons who have undertaken the cure of excessive fatness in the human race. This condition being considered by him as a disturbance of the animal economy, in consequence of which the carbon taken in is accumulated in the form of fat. Diet and exercise, as might be expected, constitute the basis of his treatment. As in the method of Mr. Banting, which, some years ago, was much in vogue, the diet advised for fat persons consists of food containing a large percentage of nitrogen, to which some vegetables without starch, and cooked fruit, are to be added, for the purpose of moderating the excitement due to animal nourishment. The diet is to be varied according as individuals are of a sanguine or lymphatic temperament. The use of certain wines is permitted; beer is, however, entirely forbidden. Coffee and tea are allowed, but with as little sugar as possible. Cheese, potatoes, rice, beans, peas, maize, macaroni, tapioca, arrowroot, and soups are not allowed. The use of sulphate of soda is recommended, as moderating the transformation of nitrogenous materials and stimulating the oxidation of fat; and the use of mineral waters containing the sulphate of soda in solution is considered of the greatest importance in this respect. The waters of Marienbad, which are especially rich in this salt, are stated to have, generally, the most happy effects. Their use, together with some alkaline pills, and a strict adherence to the conditions above mentioned, cause a decrease in weight of from twenty-five to sixty pounds, in different individuals, in the course of a few weeks. —Harper's Magazine.

IMMIGRATION OF ENGLISH AGRICULTURISTS.—At length, and not before time, some of the noblemen and gentlemen of England, who own large estates, are getting frightened at the tide of emigration toward America, which has for this year set in stronger than ever. During the month of May, no fewer than 14,000 English agricultural laborers left Liverpool for the United States. This does not include the exodus from Ireland. Farmers throughout the south of England are in despair as to how their crops will be got in this year. Whole villages are being emptied of their population. It is something quite new for agricultural laborers to immigrate in any like numbers. But they have got it into their heads, and not without reason, that the chance in your country for them is even greater and better than it is for artisans. In many of our English counties the farm laborer never gets more than perhaps once a month, and then he can only afford fat bacon. How can he afford to eat anything like butcher's meat, when beef is eight pence a pound, and mutton ten pence a pound, and he has but eleven shillings a week wages, and has, perhaps, seven or eight children to feed? But you will say, what has all this to do with fashionable life? I reply, very much. The great mass of our nobility and gentry derive their incomes from their landed estates, and if this emigration continues, which it seems very likely to do, wages must rise and rents fall on all the estates in England. And this, of course, will create a still greater comparative wealth for those who make, or who have made, their money by trade. —London Correspondence of New York Herald.

TO DESTROY ANTS.—The editor of the Canada Farmer says: At a former residence we were much troubled with ants in our lawn, and never succeeded in subduing them, though we tried many methods. Since that time we have met with many modes, recommended in the columns of our exchanges, as being thoroughly effectual; they are worthy of a trial, though we cannot vouch for their value, as we have not had an opportunity of putting them to the test:

1. Pour, copiously, hot water, as near the boiling point as possible, down their burrows and over their hills, and repeat the operation several times.
2. Entrap the ants by means of narrow sheets of stiff paper or strips of board, covered with some sweet sticky substance; the ants are attracted by the sweets, and sticking fast, can be destroyed as often as a sufficient number are entrapped.
3. Lay fresh bones around their haunts; they will leave everything else to attack these, and when thus accumulated, can be dipped in hot water.
4. Pour two or three spoonfuls of coal oil into their holes, and they will abandon them.
5. Bury a few slices of onions in their nests, and they will abandon them.

A WHOLESOME DRINK.—The excessive use of cold water during the sweltering heat of summer often results in serious and alarming illness. It is therefore advisable that some beverage should be substituted for it, of which those oppressed can partake with safety. For this purpose I am aware of no better nor more refreshing drink than the following: Take of the best Jamaica ginger root, carefully bruised, two ounces; cream of tartar, one ounce; water, six quarts, to be boiled for about five minutes, then strained; to the strained liquor add one pound of sugar, and again place it over the fire; keep it well stirred till the sugar is perfectly dissolved, and then pour it into an earthen vessel, into which you have previously put two drachms of tartaric acid and the rind of one lemon, and let it remain till the heat is reduced to a lukewarm temperature, then add a tablespoonful of yeast, stirring them well together, and bottle for use. The corks must be well secured. This drink will be in perfection in four days. This is a very refreshing and wholesome beverage, and one which may be largely partaken of without any unpleasant results even in the hottest weather. —German Town Telegraph.
