Heavy Damages Demanded from Alleged Jury Bribers.

DARK PRESENTMENT INDICED.

A Treacherous Parasite Destroying the Altitude in Idaho—Southern Pacific News.

Surveyor General Green of California is making a plan to provide large public lands to be worked by the unemployed.

Thomas Black, 340 Fifth street, San Francisco, attempted to commit suicide yesterday night by swallowing a dose of strychnine. He was probably doing this in a fit of jealousy.

A new industry is in course of development at Astoria, Or. It consists in the gathering and shipment of bear pelts for the fur trade.

A. R. Neberg threatened the life of Justice of the Peace Livingston for denying a suit against him yesterday, in the presence of the judge, and was escaped by climbing out of a window in his chambers.

Thos. M. Scott, driver of the forty-ton hospital ambulance in Salt Lake, died yesterday morning from the effects of the injuries sustained by him by the striking of the ambulance at the Hotel Utah last Monday.

A parasite has made its appearance in some of the alkali fields in the vicinity of Boise, Idaho, says the Shoshone, that promises to be troublesome. It is a tiny, very plant of yellowish color. It grows in a mass about the size of the thumb and kills it off.

Mrs. Wm. D. Neberg, of San Francisco, has sent the Southern Pacific company to recover \$50,000 on the death of her husband, a switchman, who was killed at Fourth and King streets through alleged negligence of the company.

Mrs. Isabelle J. Martin, the mother of "Baby John," who lost her son against Mrs. Henry Martin, has filed a suit against her for \$100,000. She claims that her son was killed by the negligence of the Martin family.

Richard Alphonse is in a tight spot to have a grand jury in the county seat. At a time meeting in Assembly hall Thursday evening a committee on general arrangements was elected and its members are busy preparing for the grand jury.

The grand jury was sent to all the county seats, the jury is to be with us and reports generally indicate acquiescence.

On Monday night, says the Sacramento Record-Examiner, a young lad named Peter Rogers was brought over from Davisville, on the local train and taken to the sleeping hospital, where City Physician Fowler dressed a laceration wound on the right leg caused by his being caught between the wheels of two freight cars.

The laceration of the foot was a serious one and it is believed that the boy would have been killed had he not been rescued.

Henry Felling, the president of the First National bank of Portland, says a dispatch has been received by the grand jury of Multnomah county, Ore., that a man named Rogers was killed by the train.

He is charged with the murder of Rogers and is being held in the city jail.

The grand jury is expected to return a verdict in the case of Rogers.

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
