

PORTUGAL'S KING ON SHAKY THRONE

Ominous Tranquility at Lisbon
Viewed as Calm Before
Storm.

REPUBLIC SEEMS IMMINENT.

Disinterested Opinion, However, Indi-
cates That Such a Step at This Time
Would Mean Ruin Forever.

Lisbon, Feb. 25.—Whether or not a republic is soon to supplant the monarchy in Portugal, it is practically the unanimous opinion here that the near future will witness a violent struggle in which the life of the monarchy may be at stake. The comparative tranquility since the assassination is simply a breathing spell in which the forces of the monarchy on one hand and of popular government on the other are being marshaled for the fray.

Since the assassination of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz, the Republicans have been joined by the Disinterested Progressists, and they intend to make their campaign for a change of regime openly in the coming electoral contest. The exposure of political corruption, the manner in which an army of clients was maintained at the expense of the public treasury and above all the secret advances made to the royal family, they claim, have destroyed forever the prestige of the monarchy. Disinterested opinion, however, does not consider Portugal ripe for a republic. It believes, in fact, that the country under a popular regime, in the present backward state of the masses, would become a prey of the ambitions of politicians and like the Central American republics, would be without stability.

Under the present circumstances, the course of the young king is most dangerous, as he has placed the destiny of the throne in the hands of the leaders of the two discredited old parties, men whose past prevents them from meeting their adversaries in the open field of political discussion and who, the people will insist, must be disciplined.

FIFTY AMERICAN WARSHIPS TO ANCHOR IN 'FRISCO BAY

San Francisco, Feb. 25.—From present indications it is estimated that there will be about fifty United States warships of the various classes assembled in the San Francisco bay with the arrival of Rear-Admiral Evans' fleet early in May. In the battleship class, the fleet of Admiral Evans probably will be joined by the famous Oregon, now undergoing repairs in the Bremerton navy yard, and the Wisconsin, at present at Mare Island, will go into commission on April 1.

New York, Feb. 25.—Attacking race-track gambling as a prolific breeder of crime and supporting the bill for its prohibition, Gov. Joseph W. Folk of Missouri aroused the Civic Forum at Carnegie hall tonight.

1,000 MEN GO TO WORK.

Reading, Pa., Feb. 25.—The local plant of the American Iron and Steel company resumed today, after a two month's idleness. It employs nearly 1,000 hands.

MORSE WITHDRAWS PLEA AND FILES DEMURRER.

New York, Feb. 25.—Charles W. Morse today in the supreme court withdrew his plea of not guilty to the indictment charging perjury, which was recently returned against him, and in its place filed a demurrer to the indictment. Arguments on the demurrer will be heard on March 2.

In the argument over the withdrawal of the plea, portions of an affidavit which had been filed by counsel for Morse were read to the court. The affidavit declared that Morse had gone abroad to look after some financial interests there and when he reached the other side he found himself asking him to return on the ground that he had been indicted and that he was felt, in some quarters, to be a fugitive from justice.

He had immediately returned, calling upon or communicating with each and every one of the witnesses who had given testimony before the grand jury, upon which the indictment was based, and each one of the four, the affidavit said, had supported Morse's contention that the checks and money referred to in the indictment belonged to Mr. Morse, and that he had not committed larceny or misappropriation or been guilty of false pretenses. The affidavit declared also that each of the four had stated that they had not given any testimony before the grand jury that was sufficient to sustain the indictment.

The men who so went before the grand jury, it was declared, were F. Augustus Henne, ex-justice J. O'Brien, Miles O'Brien, vice president of the Mercantile National bank, and Edward B. Ware, cashier of the defunct National Bank of North America.

Justice Dowling announced later that a time would be fixed for argument on the motion to inspect the minutes.

NORTHERN PACIFIC TO REDUCE WAGES OF KEYMEN

St. Louis, Feb. 26.—Daniel E. Naughton, assistant clerk of the house of delegates, was today found guilty as an accessory after the fact to the alleged bribery of Delegates Priesmeyer and Warner. The sentence imposed was three months in jail and a \$100 fine. The indictment of Naughton grew out of the indictment of Priesmeyer and Warner on the charges that they accepted \$500 from Henry Ascher to secure the passage of an ordinance granting him authority to erect a garage. It was charged that Naughton endeavored to hide the \$500 in question and conceal it from the state. He was arrested in New Orleans and brought back here for trial. Warner and Priesmeyer have not yet been tried.

FATHER LEO NOT THE MAN SOUGHT

German Priest Slain by Alio Mis-
taken for Italian
Clergyman.

ANARCHIST IS VERY SORRY.

When Told of His Error, Assassin As-
sumes Grief Stricken Attitude and
Says He Will Be Manly.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 25.—The Post today published what purports to be a statement said to have been made by the assassin, Giuseppe Alio, alias Giuseppe Guarnacino and Angelo Gabriele, from which it appears that Father Leo was not the priest whom he intended to murder, but was mistaken by him for a young Italian priest who had been condemned to death by a band of anarchists who had been exiled from Sicily. This priest, it is said, had been foremost in the warfare against the malcontents in Avolo, Sicily, which culminated 12 years ago in an attack upon an Easter procession in the streets of Avolo. In the fight the priest was struck upon the head with a club by a rioter, receiving a wound which left a scar. Subsequently this priest, whose name has not been learned, came to America.

ALIO SELECTED FOR DEED.

At a meeting of the exiled anarchists in Buenos Ayres, Alio is said to have confessed, he was chosen by lot to kill the hated priest, and was sent to this country by his associates for the purpose. He did not know where to look for the condemned man, but is reported to have said that he identified Father Leo as the man on Jan. 26 last, thinking he saw as car on his forehead. When told by the interpreter that the priest he had killed was a German and had never been in Sicily, and that there was no sign on his forehead, Alio burst into a paroxysm of grief, and after it passed calmly said:

SORRY HE KILLED WRONG MAN.

"If I have killed the wrong man, I am very sorry, but I will take the consequences like a man."

Alio said his wife, who deserted him in consequence of his attacks on the church, is living in Pagina, province of Siracusa, Sicily, and her name is Sebastiana Alio.

A coroner's jury, examining into the death of Father Leo, late today returned a verdict declaring that he came to his death by the felonious act of the anarchist Alio. Only two witnesses were examined, Joseph Hines, an altar boy, told the story of the shooting. Dr. Hugh Taylor described the results of the autopsy performed on the body. Alio himself is still in jail at Colorado Springs and was not brought here for the inquest.

An information charging Alio with murder has been prepared by the district attorney, but will not be filed likely until after the funeral tomorrow.

HARRIMAN PASSES SIXTY.

New York, Feb. 25.—E. H. Harriman was 60 years old yesterday. He appeared at his office at the usual time and remained there until time to attend the ceremonies marking the opening of the new tunnel under the Hudson river.

ROYALTY NOT IMMUNE.

Electric Car Runs Down Queen and Prince at the Hague.

The Hague, Feb. 25.—Queen Wilhelmina and Prince Henry, her husband, had a narrow escape from serious injury in a carriage accident which occurred near the palace today. The prince was driving the carriage in which her majesty was seated. In a narrow part of the road an electric car, coming at full speed, suddenly collided with the vehicle before the prince could turn out. The impact was very severe and the carriage was badly wrecked, three wheels being torn off. Fortunately, neither the queen nor the prince was hurt. Her majesty was somewhat unnerved, but she was able to walk to the palace. Shortly afterward, she left the palace and went to the residence of her mother, in order to reassure her and prove that she had not been injured.

ACCESSORY TO BRIBERY.

Clerk in Missouri Legislature Sen-
tenced to Jail for Offense.

Butte, Mont., Feb. 26.—A St. Paul, Minn., dispatch to the Miner says:

THE NORTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD HAS DECLARED ITS INTENTION OF REDUCING THE SCALE OF WAGES NOW PAID ITS TELEGRAPH- ERS, BASED ON NEW POSITIONS CREATED BY THE FEDERAL LAW, WHICH BECOMES EFFECTIVE MARCH 4.

A committee of the telegraphers is now in this city in conference with the management of the Northern Pacific. Several audiences were had with General Manager Slade, but without result, and an appeal was taken to Third Vice President C. M. Levey Feb. 15. After a lengthy discussion, Mr. Levey, in behalf of the company, submitted a new schedule in which there is a cut of from \$5 to \$10 a month.

Shooting bombs at clouds has proven an ineffective method of preventing hail in Belgium. With his pear-shaped balloons, Adhem de la Hault claims to be able to get closer to the source of the hail, and to disperse the cloud by firing explosives in its midst. The first trials have been reported to be very successful. The same balloon carries meteorological instruments, and thus furnishes useful weather records.

In a novel finishing machine for woolen and worsted cloth, the material is drawn under pneumatic pressure over rolls covered with finely ground glass. The millions of fine glass particles produce an effect that cannot be given in any other way, and the result is a uniform, smooth, polished surface with a very thick nap.
