Ominous Tranquility at Lisbon Viewed as Calm Before Storm.

REPUBLIC SEEMS IMMINENT.

Disinterested Opinion, However, Indi, cates That Such a Step at This Time Would Mean Ruin Forever.

Lisbon, Feb. 25.-Whether or not a republic is soon to supplant the monarchy in Portugal, it is practically the unanimous opinion here that the near future will witness a violent struggle in which the life of the monarchy may be at stake. The comparative tranquility since the assassination is simply a breathing spell in which the forces of the monarchy on one hand and of popular government on the other are being marshalled for the fray.

ther government on the other are being marshalled for the fray. Since the assassinations of King Car-log and Crown Prince Luiz, the Repub-licans have been joined by the Dissi-dent Progressits, and they intend to make their campaign for a change of regime openly in the coming electoral contest. The exposure of political cor-ruption, the manner in which an army of clients was maintained at the ex-pense of the public treasury and above all the secret advances made to the royal family, they claim, have destroyed forever the prestige of the movarchy. Disinterested opinion, however, does not consider Portugal ripe for a republic; it believes, in fact, that the country un-der a popular regime, in the present backward state of the masses, would become a prey of the ambitions of poli-ticians and like the Central American republics, would be without stability. Under the present circumstances, the course of the young king is most dan-gerous, as he has placed the destiny of the throne in the hands of the leaders of the two discredited old parties, men-whose past prevents them from meeting their adversariles in the open field of political discussion and who, the people will insist, must be disciplined.

FIFTY AMERICAN WARSHIPS TO ANCHOR IN FRISCO BAY

San Francisco, Feb. 25.—From pres-ent indications it is estimated that there will be about fifty United States warships of the various classes as-sembled in the San Francisco bay with the arrival of Rear-Admiral Frans' fleet early in May. In the bat-tleship class, the fleet of Admiral Evans probably will be joined by the famous Oregon, now undergoins repairs in the Bremerton navy yard, and the Wiscon-sin, at present at Mare Island, will go into commission on April 1.

The had immediately returned, call-ing upon or communicating with each and every one of the witnesses who had given testimony before the grand jury, upon which the indict-ment was based, and each one of the four, the affidavit said, had supported Morse's contention that the checks and money referred to in the indict-ment belonged to Mr. Morse, and that he had not committed larceny or mis-appropriation or been guilty of false pretenses. The affidavit declared al-so that each of the four had stated that they had not given any testi-mony before the grand jury that was sufficient basis for an indictment. The men who so went before the grand jury, it was declared, were ¹⁶. Augustus Heinze, ex-Justice J. O'Brien, Miles O'Brien, vice president of the Mercantile National bank, and Edward B. Ware, cashier of the de-funct National Bank of Nerth Am-erica.
