PLANT FOR HOSPITAL.

Dr. Groves L. D. S. Institution Installing Heat and Power Building.

Work will commence immediately upon a general heating and electrical power plant at the Groves L. D. S. hospital. The new plant will be 200 feet removed from the main hospital building, and will be on the north side of Ninth street. It will cost \$20,000. The heating and electrical plant which was originally built in the rear and as a part of the main hospital building, is inadequate for the needs of the institution.

The new building will be connected with the main building by a tunnel through which the electricity and heating power will be conducted, and will be away with every possible annoyance from the generating plant. The laundry, kitchen, etc., will remain where they are at present.

DEATH TO GLOBE TROTTER.

Dr. Lahnsen, a Berlin, Germany, physician, died of typhoid fever at St. Mark's hospital, and the remains are at the morgue of S. D. Evans awaiting word from his family.
