The funer-al was held from the residence yester-day afternoon. Mr. Voorhees has been helpess for a long time but had a remeful death.

peaceful death. death. Voornees, son of Elisha and isac Voornees, son of Ellsha and Nancy Leek, was born in Clermont contry. Ohio, June 2. 1821. In early days his parents joined the Church of Josus Christ, and emigrated to Utan in 1849, in Warren Snow's company. Isac drove one of the teams for the company and hunted when the com-pany camped. Once he killed four waron loads of buffalo in a day. He sagon loads of bullado in a day. He made one trip from Fort Leavenworth, Kansas to Old Mexico, for the govern-ment and one to New Mexico freight-ing with six yoke of Oxen. He en-raged in the charcoal business in Salt Lake City but moved to Manti in 1854, where he followed farming and stock raising. During the indian wars he was very active pursuing Indians and guarding cattle. He married Eliza Lewis, who died Oct. 13, 1885. Four sons, two daughters and a number of sons, two daughters and a number of grandchildren are left to revere his memory.

As Formerly, Will be the Principal Stake-Will be Worth at the Least \$20,000.

New York, Feb. 5 .- Announcement was made today that the stakes for the Saratoga midsummer meeting would close Monday, March 5, with the exception of the cross-country fixtures, which are to have a later closing day. The principal stake of the meeting as formerly, will be he Great Republic, though it will have nothing like the value of last season. It s now a stake with \$19,609 added money and against a \$50,000 value when Sysonby gailoped off with it last year. The stake was originated by William C. Whitney,

Keene was \$4,460, which more than equal-led any two of the rich stakes won by the great son of Meiton. 
