When interviewed tonight concerning When interviewed tonight concerning the allegations, Rev. Dr. Cooke said it was true he had brought charges against Chancellor Day. He said that in a book entilled, "A Raid on Pros-perity," written by Chancellor Day, President Roosevelt was severely criti-cized and that in his opinion Dr. Day has violated the rules of the Methodist-Enizonel aburch in thus assailing the

cized and that in his opinion Dr. Day has violated the rules of the Methodist-Episcopal church in thus assailing the president. Mr. Cooke stated that the specific charge preferred was defama-tion of character. He considered that "although Syracuse university is under obligations to the Standard Oil people by reason of large money gifts," Chan-cellor Day was not justified as a min-ister of the Methodist church in assail-ing President Roosevelt. The univer-sity itself is non-sectarian. It is expected the charges will be passed upon at the April conference of the New York district. Dr. Day is charged with having spoken "evil of magistrates," in viola-tion of paragraph 20 of the general rules of the Methodist church, which warns against "uncharitable and un-profitable conversation; particularly speaking evil of magistrates or of min-isters." DAY'S OFFENSE.

DAY'S OFFENSE.

In an interview on May 8, 1906, Chan-cellor Day is credited with saying: "Anarchy of the sort practised by President Roosevelt is the most dan-derous kind of anarchy. Anarchism in the White House is the most perilous anarchism that has ever threatened our country. It means anarchy if the judges are to be set aside and their verdicts held up to criticism by the president."

None of the prominent Methodist clergymen of the city would discuss the Cooke charges for publication tonight, though in one instance it was pointed out that "speaking evil of magistrates" in the generally accepted sense of the term and as probably intended in the discipline, could hardly be construed as forbidding criticism of the public acts of an elected executive.

POUND OF FLESH HELD FOR UNDERTAKER'S DEBT

Los Angeles, March 6.—The body of Mrs. Charlotte, L. Noyes, who was shot and killed by W. P. McComas in her apartments last Friday morning, is held by the firm of undertakers which prepared the body for burial. A relative in Newburyport, Mass., has asked that the remains be forwarded to that place, but a request for funds to defray the undertaker's expenses has met with no reply.

The effects of Mrs. Noyes were auc-tioned off today in her apartments where the tragedy occurred. Mr. McComas has been formally charged with murder and will appear for hearing next Tuesday morning.
